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ROSEBURG SENIOR HIGH HOOPSTERS BEAT MARSHFIELD

Third Straight Victory in Southwestern Circuit Puts Local Team at the Top.

The Roseburg senior high school basketball team returned to Roseburg yesterday leading the Southwestern Oregon basketball league by a two-game margin, as a result of victories over North Bend and Marshfield Friday and Saturday. The Roseburg team defeated North Bend Friday night, 28 to 27, and on Saturday night won from Marshfield 24 to 15. Both games were the fastest ever seen in Coos Bay and were played before large crowds of enthusiastic fans.

Better Stamina Wins The North Bend game was an exceedingly exciting contest. North Bend took the lead in the first quarter by a score of 8 to 6. The first period was a whirlwind affair with both teams playing at high speed. In the second quarter conditioning began to show and North Bend was unable to stand the fast pace, while the Roseburg team with its players better conditioned forged into the lead and was ahead 19 to 12 at the end of the period.

After the rest period North Bend came back to resume the fast playing of the first quarter, but Roseburg began playing percentage ball, and kept possession of the ball most of the time playing for breaks. The score at the end of the third period was 25 to 20. In the last quarter North Bend opened up a long range offensive and dropped three long shots through the hoop. With a minute to go the score was tied 27 to 27 and both teams were playing frantically for the winning basket.

With less than three seconds left in the game, Roseburg center, who had been held scoreless up to that time, was fouled by a North Bend player, and was given a free throw.

He stepped to the foul line, took plenty of time for the vital throw and dropped the ball through the basket without touching the hoop, winning the game by a margin of one point.

Marshfield Easy The boys were tired Saturday night in the game against Marshfield, but held an easy lead through the entire game. The crowd started off again in whirlwind style, Roseburg making the first basket on the very first tip-off.

At the end of the quarter Roseburg was leading 9 to 6. Marshfield changed tactics in the second quarter and began holding the ball and playing for breaks, and succeeded in rinning two baskets, while Roseburg converted only one foul, making the score at the half 10 to 4. The third quarter was about even, ending 16 to 9 in Roseburg's favor, while in the last quarter the Roseburg boys put on a high speed rally that gave them a victory by a score of 24 to 15.

The game with Marshfield in this city Friday will be an important factor in this connection. Marshfield has a dangerous team, even though it has been defeated twice. The first defeat came from Bandon after Marshfield had the game practically clinched. Marshfield had an 8 to 2 lead over Bandon in the third quarter and was apparently too sure of victory, and with a game against Roseburg coming on the next night, started loafing, with the result that Bandon staged a rally that gave them a victory by a score of 15 to 14.

Coach Turner is quite worried over Friday's game, as the Roseburg team, with its present lead, is apt to have a tendency towards over-confidence, while Marshfield, having allowed itself to get into a hole through carelessness, will be determined to overcome the handicap and get back into a position that its ability warrants. Marshfield's team is very fast and is made up largely of experienced players so that Friday's game, which is to be played in the local which is to be a very fast and exciting contest.

OREGON DISTRICT ATTORNEYS FAVOR CHANGES IN LAW

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 16.—Conviction in all criminal cases where capital punishment is not involved on a verdict from 11 jurors, utilization of jail prisoners in highway construction, and the right of judges to comment upon credibility of witnesses in giving instructions to a jury, were recommended at the meeting of Oregon district attorneys yesterday.

Other resolutions called for the determination of a defendant's sanity by expert alienists and commendation of the state's organization as a means of combating juvenile delinquency.

Resolutions urging the public to lock their cars whenever they left them, and demanding an enforcement of the laws requiring the taking of finger print record of all prisoners, were passed at the joint session of the state's sheriffs and district attorneys, which concluded the convention of the two groups.

It was declared that 95 per cent of crimes committed have the assistance of automobiles, while 97 per cent of the automobiles involved have been stolen.

AUTOS TAKE LEAD IN AGENCIES OF VIOLENT DEATHS

CHICAGO, Jan. 20.—A decade of deaths from violent and unnatural causes was reviewed today by Dr. Herman N. Bundesen, Cook county coroner.

In the period from 1920 to 1930, there were 43,487 such fatalities being the principal cause. Deaths from this cause showed an increase of 100 per cent in the ten-year period. Deaths from alcoholism increased from 29 in 1920 to more than 300 last year, he said.

"Bad alcohol is the one outstanding problem faced by this office today," Dr. Bundesen said. He pointed out that bad liquor was as apt to be found in Gold Coast neighborhoods as in the slums.

Homicides during the period were 4,242, representing a gradual rise from 202 in 1920 to 429 last year. The coroner pointed out that the

total number of violent deaths in 1929 was 1,409 under that of 1928.
