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State Counts 3 Dead
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The mercury reached a minimum of 10 degrees above zero in New York City yesterday.

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More Snow Falls
Four inches of snow fell in Portland Saturday night. The fresh snowfall added the patient work of clearing the streets a couple of days ago. A force of 400 men and 120 trucks was turned loose on the blacked streets. Major arteries were cleared today.

Reports received here said automobile travel was proceeding throughout the state today, although one-way traffic was in effect on the Tillamook highway between Sheridan and Willamette and on portions of the Portland-Salem route. The west side highway, blocked Saturday, was open today, although it was so slippery that tourists were advised to use other routes when possible.

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During the enforced shutdown more than two thousand mill employees will be idle.

The large plants that have closed include the Eastern & Western Lumber company, Inman-Paulsen, Eastside Mill & Lumber company, Jones Lumber company, East Side Box company and Clark & Wilson.

All logging operations in the districts of Oregon and Washington have been suspended.

Sub-Zero and Snow
LA GRANDE, Ore., Jan. 20.—Eastern Oregon again dipped into sub-zero weather temperatures today, the mercury stopping at five degrees below zero here last night. It was the lowest since 1913 when a minimum of 34 below was recorded.

A 20-inch snow blanket, the heaviest since November, 1921, protects the wheat fields. While some alarm is expressed by apricot and peach orchardists, these fruits, it is believed, may escape injury because of the gradual low-

ering of temperatures the past two weeks and the extreme dormancy of trees. All state roads were open.

Sun Banishing Snow
GRANTS PASS, Ore., Jan. 20.—Josephine county's record-breaking snows were today being further reduced under the rays of a warm sun, supported by a gentle southerly wind. The melting snow has caused no rise in the Rogue river.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 20.—After riding through Sunday with a maximum of 19 degrees above zero, the official temperature plunged down during the night to a minimum of 2 below, the coldest since December 1919, when 6 below was recorded.

Eugene 12 Above
EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 20.—With a biting northwest wind sweeping over the city and forcing the mercury down to 12 degrees above zero today, Eugene struggled down into its coat collar and gave up all hope of immediate relief from the cold spell.

A thaw brought some hope yesterday, but the temperature began dropping at 9 a. m. and snow fell. All mills in the surrounding districts are closed and all county road work has ceased. The Multnomah highway is impassable with a heavy coating of ice.

The Myrtle Creek girls beat the Days Creek girls Saturday night by a score of 13 to 10.

Russell, pilot of the trimotored plane that crashed at San Clemente, California Sunday, was well-known in northwestern aviation circles and had flown for various people in and around Portland. For a while he was connected with the Bell Airlines, at Vancouver, Wn. Russell's last public appearance in this vicinity was during the Silverton American Legion air circus two years ago when authorities in charge of the circus ordered him to remain on the ground after a series of loops close to the ground.

Freak Weather Blamed
LOS ANGELES, Jan. 20.—T. A. T. Maddux Airlines officials today ascribed the crash Sunday night of their Agusta Caliente "race special" to freak weather. The plane, which killed 16 persons in crashing after dark half way between here and San Diego, to "one of those peculiar weather mysteries which blow in rain from the Pacific in the particular area" of the scene.

F. F. Proeg, flight superintendent at the Glendale terminal of the line, said that the pilot of the ill-fated plane apparently was blinded by the rain and fog-murk which hovered about the ocean and San Clemente bluffs. He said it was apparent that an emergency landing was being sought on account of the flying conditions, and disoriented eye witnesses reports of missing motors.

Proeg said that the line's weather stations at Point Loma, San Diego and Point Dana, San Clemente, reported a ceiling of 1500 feet, which he indicated was ample justification for the scheduled trip being made. A second T. A. T. Maddux plane, which the flight superintendent said left the Mexican resort fifteen minutes behind the doomed craft, successfully turned about at La Jolla, south of Oceanside, when it met the storm area. Proeg said the second plane, also carrying passengers, returned to Agusta Caliente.

Two Officers Missing
CHICAGO, Jan. 20.—Lieut. Rocco Passarella and Patrolman Albert Ristay—the two Melrose park policemen who made the recent liquor raids in the suburb—were still missing from their homes early today.

Reports of their disappearance varied; some had them "taken for a ride" as a gangster reprisal; others had them in hiding after repeated death threats had been received.

Neither has been seen since Friday—the day Passarella resigned from the police force; the resignation, it was said, was in lieu of a discharge intended by the village board.

Meanwhile, the United States district attorney's office became interested. Daniel Anderson, assistant district attorney, sent for Chief of Police Leesberg and the village trustees of Melrose park. After the conference, he issued the following statement:

FIGHT CARD 23RD

STRENGTHENED BY
ONE ALTERATION

Semi-Final Will Be Warm
Battle Between "Red"
Hansaker, Eugene,
and Corbett.

The semi-final of Thursday's fight card will vie with the main event in interest and excitement. Promoter Clyde Ward stated today in announcing that he has arranged a match between Joe Corbett of Roseburg and "Red" Hansaker of Eugene in place of the match scheduled between Tim Callahan and Billy Norton. The fight card was postponed from last Friday, due to the illness of Comet Gibson, one of the main event fighters, and poor showing by Callahan since the postponement was announced, has caused Promoter Ward to cancel the fight with Norton and to substitute the Corbett-Hansaker bout which local fans know is a "natural."

Hansaker, a tough, slugging fighter, recently fought a draw with "Tiger" Dunn in a fierce match in the local arena. Corbett holds a close decision over Dunn, and the showing made by the boxers in their local appearances would indicate that Corbett and Hansaker are very evenly matched, assuring fans of a slugging bout from start to finish.

Chief interest, of course, centers in the main event, which is to be an 8-round contest between Comet Gibson and Austin Pendergrass, both of this city. Because of the popularity of both boys, the fans are eagerly awaiting the forthcoming match. Promoter Ward, as a result of the postponement last week, required the fighters to post forfeits to assure their appearance Thursday night, and holds \$50 cash forfeits from both boys. Gibson is reported to have recovered from his severe cold and has resumed his training.

The entire card indicates lots of action. Paul Laird of Coquille and Young Dunn of Roseburg, who recently fought a hard draw, are rematched at their own request, with a "winner-take-all" provision. "Kid" Maley of Sutherlin will fight Jim Franco of Roseburg in one of the preliminaries and Pat Franco of Roseburg will appear against Kid Booker of Cottage Grove in the first bout of the evening.

officer of each military station with enforcement of the prohibition laws within his jurisdiction. It also extends army discipline. Mr. Hurley said, to any officer convicted by civil authorities of prohibition law violations of government reservations.

The new regulation was issued, Mr. Hurley said, as the army's contribution to the administration effort for stricter enforcement of prohibition. Its scope extends to army posts in the Philippines and wherever they may be outside the continental United States even though there be no prohibition law in that country. It was pointed out, however, that the older army regulations made all these posts dry.

Cabinet Heads Called
WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—Secretary of the Treasury Mellon will be the first witness before the house expenditures committee at hearings beginning Wednesday on President Hoover's proposal to transfer the prohibition enforcement unit from the treasury to the justice department.

Chairman Williamson of the expenditures committee announced that Attorney General Mitchell also will appear. Prohibition Commissioner James M. Moran likewise is expected to testify.

The hearings probably will occupy three days.

Dry Want More Coin
DETROIT, Jan. 20.—Prohibition sermons in 40 churches in the Detroit metropolitan area brought the anti-saloon league convention here to a close yesterday. Senator Morris Sheppard, of Texas, who introduced the eighteenth amendment in congress and who now sponsors a proposal that the purchaser of liquor be held equally guilty with the seller, asserted the wets were forever defeated in congress.

Dr. F. Scott McBride, general superintendent of the league, made an appeal for funds and declared that "never more than at the present, has there been a greater need for a militant, aggressive spirit." He said that about \$500,000 of the \$1,500,000 fund for carrying on the league's activities has been expended. The fund is known as the Wayne B. Wheeler memorial fund.

"We have been lumping along for lack of funds," he said.

Senator Sheppard praised prohibition enforcement as "effective," but added that "it will be still more effective when the buyer of liquor is given the same punishment as is visited upon the seller."

We need to make but few examples of the highbrows who think they are above the law which governs humber folk, in order to smash the bottom out of the bootleg market and reduce the illegal liquor traffic to the disappearing point."

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Poison Ban Asked
WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—Representative Strovich, democrat of New York, today urged President Hoover to recommend legislation requiring that denatured alcohol be processed with non-poisonous materials.

Strovich told press correspondents that England, France and Germany used non-poisonous denaturing materials and that they had been just as effective in keeping people from drinking denatured alcohol as the poisonous materials now being used in this country.

52 OIL COMPANIES BROKE ANTI-TRUST LAW, COURTS SAY

CHICAGO, Jan. 20.—The United States circuit court of appeals today issued a final decree adjudging 52 oil companies guilty of violating the Sherman anti-trust act in pooling their oil cracking patents and enjoining them permanently from further violations of the law. The court order was signed by Judges Evan A. Evans and George T. Pugs, the same judges who sat with Judge A. B. Anderson on trial judges in United States district court.
