

## ROSEBURG SENIOR HIGH BASKETEERS FACE HARD GAME

**Fuel on Ration Basis**  
SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 23.—Sub-zero temperature for the last two weeks in the inland empire of the northwest today was taking its toll in human suffering.

Ant Julinetta, Idaho, where the mercury had registered 29 degrees below zero, the town's only fuel dealer said that his supply of coal would not last until a shipment promised for next week arrived. He started rationing coal to residents today. Many families were reported to be suffering.

**Emergency measures** were adopted at Wallace, Idaho, where water pipes were frozen and reservoirs were being depleted. Pipes to one section of the town were cut off as the only means of allowing reservoirs to become refilled for fire protection. Other sections of the two main mains were frozen, cutting off many residences.

The Coeur d'Alene river near Mullan, in the Coeur d'Alene mining section, became jammed with ice and overflowed into business district basements.

a hopeful and conciliatory spirit.

He repeated France's need for a navy in view of her colonial expansion and touched by inference on the long held French desire for some international accord for security.

The address of Dino Grandi, the Italian foreign minister, was virtual repetition of what he had said at the opening session on Tuesday. The Italians have had many conferences during the last two days, including a long conversation between Foreign Minister Grandi and Foreign Minister Briand of France but there was no indication that they had brought the two governments nearer together.

For Japan, Reijiro Wakatsuki again outlined in general terms his nation's feeling that it would have real recognition commensurate with its needs in any naval readjustment. This, like the question of Anglo-American parity, was being kept momentarily submerged.

**Open Sessions Promised**

Prime Minister MacDonald, after the adjournment, was asked by newspapermen if there would be open sessions. He replied promptly in the affirmative and then, after a short hesitation, continued: "I will tell you what I told them in there: I said let us have open conferences whenever possible. We must consider the needs of the press."

Amid much laughter, the conference chairman parried a successive question as to the details of the conference plans. Asked when would be taken up, he said: "There is first the question of fleets on the sea, second the question of fleets laid down, and third, fleets provided for by various votes of parliament."

"We are here to find agreement for the lowest possible level of strength at sea compatible with the security of the five sea powers. Then we want to prepare the way for general disarmament."

**Everyone Satisfied**  
Every delegation expressed satisfaction with the tone of the day's meeting. The Italians indicated they were especially pleased to find they and the Americans might be in agreement on some important principles including limitation on a basis of nations.

J. L. Raketon, of Canada, said that no Canadian exposition of the naval question would be made at this time but that Canada was prepared to cooperate 100 per cent

in the purposes of the conference.

In an informal meeting with newspaper correspondents, Premier MacDonald said:

"I do hope you will do your best to circulate reliable stories about this conference. We were perfectly horrified this morning at the reported story in the American press regarding the alleged condition here which was absolutely untrue. This story was the greatest exercise of imagination ever indulged in."

(The story Mr. MacDonald referred to was not carried by the Associated Press.)

**Delegates in Huddle**

LONDON, Jan. 23.—After this morning's meeting at which national viewpoints were presented, the big five, composed of the heads of the American, British, Japanese, French and Italian delegations, were summoned to number 10 Downing street for a consultation.

The meeting was regarded as perhaps the most important gathering since the convening of the naval conference on Tuesday.

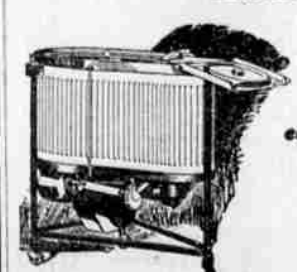

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## DELEGATIONS TO NAVAL PARLEY MAP PROCEDURE PLANS

LONDON, Jan. 23.—A two-hour session of the chief delegates to the naval conference at No. 10 Downing street this afternoon resulted in the definite mapping of a plan of offensive against naval armaments.

Under this program the individual nations will arrive to settle their differences one with another while the "big five" or leaders of each delegation, sit as umpires or referees of the work, ready to take the field themselves and to lend a helpful hand whenever deadlocks occur.

The big five leaders are Prime Minister MacDonald, Secretary Macdonald, Premier Tardieu, Foreign Minister Grandi and former Premier Wakasuki.

This is the method the Americans have favored for conduct of the London negotiations and Secretary Stimson was highly pleased as he rode through a drizzling rain from Downing street to his hotel to prepare for the lord mayor's banquet at the Guild hall tonight.

By the method of procedure adopted, the delegations will work as units rather than by setting up numerous committees of expert advisers and technicians.

The next meeting of the delegations has been called for Monday morning and meanwhile the various delegations will fall to the tasks. Late today definite meetings had not been fixed but they will proceed along the lines of the major problems, the French conferring with the Italians and the British with the Americans, with interposed conferences between the British and the Japanese, the Americans and the Japanese, and the British and the continental powers.

**20 OFFICIALS DIE IN ALBANIAN REVOLT**

ATHENS, Jan. 23.—Twenty Albanian government officials were said in reports reaching Salonika today to have been killed at Dibra in an insurrection which broke out there against the reign of King Zog.

An assembly of the chiefs of the various clans, including the Mardites, held at Eniskoni proclaimed the dethronement of King Zog despite the efforts of an Italian officer to pacify the chiefs by offers of money and despite arguments of the chief of gendarmerie.

Several Albanian political refugees have returned to the insur-

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gent districts from Yugoslavia. Chiefs of the insurgent clans were reported to have killed King Zog's local partisans.
