LIVESTOCK SCHOOL IN PORTLAND FOR OREGON BANKERS

PORTLAND, Jan. 23.—A livestock program for the state of Oregon is being considered by representative bankers from all parts of the state who opened their third annual bankers' agricultural short course today in the livestock exchange building in North Portland. The two-day session is under the joint auspices of the agricultural committee of the Oregon Bankers' association and the Oregon State college extension service.

"Approximately three-fourths of Oregon's area is grazing land suitable for livestock production on an extensive scale," said Eugene Courtney of Woodburn, chairman of the bankers' agricultural committee. "Sheep and cattle from these sources constitute one of our chief sources of income."

Paul V. Maris, director of extension, opened the session this morning with a talk on the livestock markets, grazing practices and livestock financing. This afternoon L. Barnum of The Dalles, president of the bankers' association, is chairman, with C. C. Colt of Portland in charge tomorrow.

FEDERAL DRY LAW PROVISION RULED UNCONSTITUTIONAL

OMAHA, Neb., Jan. 23.—Federal Judge W. Woodruff, in an opinion handed down today, declared unconstitutional that part of the federal prohibition law which permits personal injunctions against liquor law violators.

Judge Woodruff's ruling was in the case of Frank Cunningham of Scotts Bluff, Neb., against whom the government had filed several injunction suits on the strength of the fact that Cunningham had been arrested several times on charges of selling liquor.

In a nine-page memorandum, Judge Woodruff sets forth his ruling, as follows:

"A trial and acquittal by jury is to afford protection against this equity process (the personal injunction). Jury trial, guaranteed by the constitution as the bulwark of liberty, and a shield against the oppression of government, simply takes out of the picture the government's right to demand a guilty verdict regardless of what a jury might have said in the matter, the judge shall lay personal injunction upon him, and thereafter, during the life of the accused, if the judge thinks the man has offended again, the judge shall imprison him."

"There runs through the act the idea that the man himself, the human being, is a nuisance, and so beyond the pale of the right to trial by jury."

Judge Woodruff, in announcing his opinion said the section of the law which permits personal injunctions has been a "dead letter" in the law for 16 years because it shocks common sense and common understanding of the constitution.

"Who thinks that when a boot-licker is placed under injunction that he will quit for the rest of his life?" the judge asked.

"The hope and expectation, and the only one is that the man will be placed in jail without the trouble of a jury trial."

NEW SPECIES OF MOSQUITO FOUND MAN'S PROTECTOR

HONOLULU, Jan. 23.—Discovery of a new species of mosquito, a new species of mosquito, is disclosed in a campaign to rid Hawaiian sugar plantations of this pest.

A newly found race of mosquitoes destroy the biting kind by millions, yet themselves lack the boring tool necessary to bite man.

The cannibals are whoopers, an inch long, brightly colored in blues, greens and browns.

It sounds like a fairy tale to add that in adult stage after they have destroyed their quota of mosquitoes, they live on the nectar of flowers and juices of crushed or broken fruit, but that is the plain, scientific dietary fact reported by their discoverer, C. E. Pemberton, a Hawaiian entomologist.

Pemberton found these mosquitoes while hunting for the most effective of all methods of insect control—namely, a parasite, a bug which lives on the pest, and incidentally kills him.

He found in New Britain the answer in the larvae of the large, bright-colored mosquitoes whose scientific name is Megarhinus Inornatus.

These larvae were feeding on other larvae, with preference for the wigglers of blood-sucking mosquitoes. Pemberton found that each big mother cannibal mosquito laid about 60 eggs, and each wiggler developing therefrom ate about 250 larvae.

Arithmetic shows that the young of one mother might destroy about 15,000 mosquitoes, and her grandchildren more than 50,000,000.

Recently Pemberton turned loose among the plantations 300 of the big larvae to see whether they would multiply in their new home.

Transporting them from New Britain required entomological legislation. The steamers take more than 21 days for the trip but after 21 days the wigglers turn into mosquitoes.

Pemberton needed them to be still in the wiggler stage on arrival.

He learned how to delay their maturity by underfeeding. At each steamer stop he went ashore, catching mosquito larvae for his flock of 300, and brought them through safely.

DWIGHT F. BROOKS, LUMBERMAN, DIES

PALM SPRINGS, Cal., Jan. 23.—Dwight F. Brooks, 33, wealthy lumberman of Minneapolis, Minn., and Vancouver, Wash., died here on Tuesday, January 21, from a stroke of apoplexy. It was learned today that he had come here about two weeks previously, entering a sanitarium to rest. The body is being returned to Minneapolis for burial.

Mr. Brooks had extensive lumber holdings in Minnesota and on the Pacific coast. In late years he had lived at Vancouver, Wash., in an effort to regain his health.

PATTERSON DEATH RESOLUTIONS ARE DRAWN AT SALEM

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 23.—The following resolution has been adopted by the state board of control on the death of Isaac Lee Patterson:

WHEREAS, throughout his official life, and particularly as governor of the state of Oregon, the late Isaac Lee Patterson gave unstintingly and unselfishly of his rare talents and energies toward the realization of his lofty and most worthy ideals and ambition—that of making the state of Oregon, the beloved state of his nativity, the most constructively prosperous of the United States—and died in the faithful performance of his duty to the state and its citizenship, a virtual martyr to such service, for it was in the discharge of an official function of his high office that he contracted the malady which brought about his demise; and

WHEREAS, in the sudden and untimely death of Governor Patterson the state of Oregon and every department and function of state government and the people of the state of Oregon have lost a most loyal, conscientious and faithful champion of good government, friend and citizen; a man of fine presence, great personal dignity, unimpeachable integrity, sterling worth and refinement of character;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That the Oregon state board of control, on behalf of the state officers and the entire executive, administrative, judicial and legislative family of the state of Oregon, hereby proclaims acknowledgment and sincere appreciation of the loyal, unselfish and constructive service the late Governor Isaac Lee Patterson has rendered the state as an ideal statesman and governor; that we deeply and profoundly deplore the coming of the silent summons of the grim messenger of death that called him from our midst at the height of his official career and before his labor of devotion to his beloved commonwealth was finished, and that we extend our most heartfelt sympathies to his widow, his sons and relatives in their hour of bereavement.

RESOLVED: That these resolutions be spread upon the records of this administrative body, that a copy thereof be given to the press of the state and that an engrossed copy be presented the bereaved widow.

JAZZ DOMINANCE OF RADIO CAUSES STRONG PROTESTS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—The charge that broadcasting, as authorized by the radio commission had been "prostituted" and that the value of programs offered by 690 stations was based upon their popularity, was made before the senate interstate commerce committee today by Hope Thompson, Chicago attorney.

Thompson made his charge in bringing the claim of station WCFM, of Chicago, operated by the American Federation of Labor, for a cleared channel. The station is now required by the commission to cease broadcasting at sunset, Pacific time, and an appeal is pending.

Thompson said the station could do almost nothing on day-light hours with the educational programs it wished to present, but that other stations were broadcasting purely popular programs.

"Why should the air be used," he asked, "to sing 'Old Pat' all the time?"

He added that WCFM was not opposed to entertainment part of the time, but that its theory was that the air ought also be used to educate and instruct.

Majority Want Jazz

"I don't see any reason in the world," he said, "why 690 stations should try to outdo each other with jazz."

Discussing possible legislation, the witness expressed the opinion that congress could control the situation but added that it did not have the "nerve" to do so.

Launching into a general discussion of radio stations, Thompson said that they could not sell advertising unless they could prove the presence of many listeners. They obtained these listeners, he added, by presenting popular programs.

"Ten times as many people will listen to 'Amos and Andy,'" the witness asserted "as will listen to an instructive program."

Senator Wheeler, democrat, Montana, expressed the opinion that a large minority wanted to hear something educational. He said it was "perfectly absurd" for the commission to say that all

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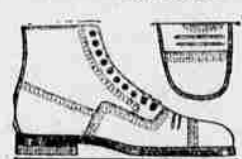
