DOWN in Portland they are discussing proposed changes in the street car system. The purpose of these changes, it is asserted, is to give patrons of the trolley system "rides at cost," thus avoiding the painful necessity of increasing street car fares from eight cents to ten cents.

POSSIBLY. But cynical onlookers, who are not concerned one way or another, will say to themselves that the ultimate, although unspoken, purpose of these proposed changes is to unload another obsolete street car system on the public.

SURFACE street cars are already out of date, and getting more so all the time. In New York, they are already scarce. In Chicago, their use is steadily declining.

Even in San Francisco, with a five-cent fare made possible by partial municipal ownership, plus location on a peninsula which makes use of automobiles for transportation between the suburbs and the downtown districts difficult and costly, street car transportation is having troubles of its own.

THE street car doesn't meet modern demands for speed and comfort and independence, and so all over the country street car systems are showing a loss to their owners. This being the case, we may look for more and more agitation for municipal ownership of street car lines. That is about the only way in which the owners of an obsolete utility can hope to unload without a heavy loss.

NEW YORK relies for transportation upon subways, elevated railways and suburban trains operating on their own rights of way—all providing very fast transportation, which, because of the large number of passengers handled, is quite reasonable in price.

The result is a relatively small and extremely congested business district on Manhattan island, with comparatively unimportant suburban business districts.

CHICAGO people depend for getting back and forth from their homes to their business upon suburban trains and elevated railways. These are very fast and reasonably cheap, making it possible to live a long way from one's work and also to shop at long range.

Again, with these conditions, we see in Chicago, as in New York, a relatively small and tremendously congested business district, confined within the loop around which the elevated railways operate, with comparatively unimportant suburban business districts.

LET us now turn to Los Angeles, where many of its more thoughtful residents will tell you, the rotten transportation system in the world, consisting entirely of surface cars, with neither subways nor elevated.

As a result of this condition, the people of Los Angeles depend largely upon the automobile for getting back and forth from their homes to their business.

Communist Activities Prompt
Mexico To Order Withdrawal of
Its Entire Legation in Russia

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 24.—The entire staff of the Mexican legation at Moscow has been ordered by the Mexican government to leave soviet Russia as a protest against communist activities against the Mexican City regime both at home and abroad.

Political circles expect the action to result in recall by the soviet of the Russian minister in this capital, A. M. Makar. The Mexican government thus far has made no move to oblige him to leave the capital; he remained at the legation last night and refused to make any statement.

A statement by Genaro Estrada, foreign minister, revealed that the Mexican minister at Moscow had been ordered to leave several days ago and that the charge d'affaires and all others in the embassy personnel yesterday were directed to quit the Russian capital "as an act of protest."

The statement referred to recent "communist" manifestations before Mexican embassies in some of the capitals on the American continent on the pretext of protesting against measures being taken here in the case of foreign agitators who interfered with Mexican domestic affairs and endeavored to "rough" public opinion.

The reference obviously being to embassies in Washington, Buenos Aires and Rio Janeiro.

RACIAL WAR
RENEWED IN
CALIFORNIA

Four Filipinos Beaten and
White Man Stabbed at
San Jose During
Armed Patrol.

Deportation of Competing
Workers Urged; Lack of
Social Color Line
at Club Irks.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
WATSONVILLE, Cal., Jan. 24.—Racial hatred, inflamed by the employment of white dancing girls in a Filipino club here, seethed again in the Santa Clara valley today as the result of two clashes at San Jose, in which one white man was stabbed and four Filipinos badly beaten.

The outbreak at San Jose, which occurred last night, came while armed patrols were guarding the streets and highways here to prevent any possible recurrence of the fighting which has raged intermittently for five days, resulting in the death of one Filipino, the flooding of several others, and the arrest of seven white men on rioting charges.

Onlooker Stabbed
Alfred Johnson, 22, was stabbed twice in the back and critically wounded while he was watching a clash between Filipinos and whites at San Jose. There were two fights, two Filipinos having been beaten in each. Police said white men were the aggressors in each case.

Discovery of an alleged Filipino pamphlet called "The Torch" to which was attributed the statement that "Filipinos have as much right to American girls as Americans," was reported to peace officers.

The body of Permin Tehera, 22, a Filipino, was found in a bunk house east of here yesterday. He had been shot through the heart. Authorities said shots had been fired into the building by a mob of white men Wednesday night, and that several Filipinos fled from the place in terror.

Legion Aids Officers
Pool halls and similar places of amusement here were closed at 6 o'clock last night by order of city officials. Members of the American Legion joined peace officers in preserving order.

The Watsonville Rotary club adopted resolutions deploring the rioting and calling upon the authorities to stop it. A few days ago the Northern Monterey chamber-

TROXEL GUILTY OF
DRUNKEN DRIVING,
VERDICT OF JURY

T. A. Troxel, charged with driving a car while under the influence of liquor, was found guilty by the jury in the justice court, in which the case was tried, late yesterday afternoon. The trial of the case consumed two days and was bitterly contested. The state sprung a surprise on the defense by bringing in Troxel's father-in-law, J. E. Zachary, who the defense claimed was too ill to testify. Zachary, who was in the car at the time of the wreck, testified that Troxel had been drinking on the trip prior to the wreck in which Troxel hit a truck driven by a junk dealer, Solomon Maus. The jury was out only a few minutes before returning its verdict. Troxel is expected to receive his sentence late this afternoon or early tomorrow. The case may be appealed.

PASTOR TRIES TO
BEAT ALLEGED WIFE
STEALER, CHARGED

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 24.—Alleging that Rev. Robert L. Payne attempted to assault "Girli O'Neil," first with a stick of wood and then a chair, at a domestic meeting, a complaint against the pastor of the First Baptist church was filed in justice court late last night. Payne has not yet been arrested.

The meeting was called Thursday night to ask Payne to resign. Payne has often been at odds with his congregation since coming here two years ago from Missouri. Soon after his arrival the congregation split and a second church organization was formed.

The latest difficulty with Payne is in connection with the departure of his wife several weeks ago for Los Angeles. This followed her appearance at the O'Neil home with a story of abuse at her husband's hands. O'Neil admitted that he helped her to get away.

In the course of the argument last night witnesses say Payne shouted at O'Neil: "You are the man who ran away with my wife," and brandished an epithet which is calculated to bring on a fight, unless, according to a western classic, it is accompanied by a smile. From all accounts Payne wasn't in a smiling mood, and brandished a stick of wood at O'Neil when the latter insisted on reading a letter that his wife had received from Payne's sister-in-law in Los Angeles. The stick was taken away from the preacher and then he seized a chair.

Payne recently went to Los Angeles and brought Mrs. Payne back to Salem. She was present at the meeting last night.

Mercury Rises Rapidly and
Approach of Spring Is

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 24.—The first potential breath of spring to breeze into Portland and immediate vicinity came today on the heels of rising temperature, clear skies and universal sighs from all concerned that winter had come and spring was not far behind.

Although the weather bureau yesterday predicted no immediate change in conditions, it was much milder this morning and the observers said fair skies would prevail Saturday also.

The highest within the past 24 hours was 26 degrees above which compared to the below freezing temperature of the last two weeks was a welcome relief.

The winter weather of the past 10 days began a gradual breakup at The Dalles and the minimum temperature last night was six above zero. Three inches of additional snow fell during the night and an overcast sky indicated more.

Fruit growers were satisfied with the breakup because of the lack of damage to trees.

Two Cathlamet, Wash., today brought the first general news of the outside world the town had received for more than a week during which time it was isolated by impassable snowdrifts on highways and a treacherous ice filled river through which boats could not pass.

The trucks blocked drifts all day yesterday and aided by townsmen with tractors and snowblows managed to open the road from Kelso to Cathlamet. A tug, especially equipped to break ice, was reported enroute from Astoria, Ore., loaded with several tons of food for the town. Grocery supplies, E. M. Orth, Cathlamet banker.

Delegates Agree That All
Future Full Sessions
Shall Be Opened
to the Press.

English-American Problem
Resolves Around Limit
on Cruisers; Italy
Demands Parity.

LONDON, Jan. 24.—Delegates to the five-power naval conference virtually wound up their first week's work today with a whirl of activity bringing Anglo-American unity sharply to the fore for the first time and pointing to publicity for all future full meetings of the conference.

At the suggestion of Henry L. Stimson, American secretary of state, the troublesome cruiser problem which wrecked the Geneva conference seems certain to be the first taken up in arranging details of parity of the British and American navies.

The day's round of conferences also kept the Italian demand for parity with the French and Anglo-French disagreements over the scope of the conference constantly under the microscope.

Lots of Footwork
The French went to No. 10 Downing street this morning where, with the British delegates, they examined at length a memorandum prepared by Rene Massigli of the French delegation, and Robert Leslie Graham of the British foreign office, dealing with points of difference.

Dino Grandi, Italian foreign minister, also saw Mr. MacDonald and then hurried away for an appointment with Secretary Stimson. The quick succession of conferences kept the general picture of the negotiations changing rapidly.

The American delegates, meeting in their conference room five stories above Piccadilly in the Ritz this afternoon engaged in a general discussion of subjects in which the Americans were interested. The meeting was held without the

4 BRITONS IN TEN
MILLION SWINDLE
GET LONG TERMS

LONDON, Jan. 24.—Clarence Hatry, for many years head of the widespread Hatry interests, was sentenced to fourteen years penal servitude at the Old Bailey court today and an additional five years on charges of defrauding.

Hatry also was sentenced to two years on a charge of conspiracy, all sentences to run concurrently.

Edmund Daniels, co-defendant with Hatry, was sentenced to seven years penal servitude and five years to run concurrently and at age two years on another count and a further five years on a second indictment, all to run concurrently.

Albert E. Tabor, a second co-defendant, was sentenced to two periods of three years to run concurrently and also a further two years at hard labor also to run concurrently.

John Graham Dixon, the third co-defendant, received five years of penal servitude and two years at hard labor as well as a further period of five years penal servitude all to run concurrently.

The four men were on trial for alleged Hatter frauds involving nearly \$2,000,000 (about \$10,000,000).

NORBLAD WILL PUT
HOOVER LAND PLAN
UP TO COMMITTEE

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 24.—An exhaustive study of President Hoover's plan to turn over to the state great tracts of federal land, but retaining for the government timber, oil and mineral rights, will be undertaken by a committee to be appointed by Governor Norblad.

This decision was reached at a conference here yesterday of prominent bankers, educators, foresters, agriculturists, publishers and business men who were called together by the governor to discuss the effect of the proposed gift.

Questions raised at the meeting indicated considerable opposition to the plan. Among these questions were: Who will pay for restoration of public lands which have been depreciated through neglect and lack of regulation by the federal government? Should the terms of such lands to the state be considered as adequate compensation for natural resources such as timber, which have been removed from states by the federal government for the benefit of the entire nation? What effect would the proposed gift have on reclamation lands and their future development?

It was pointed out that more than 12,000,000 acres, representing a quarter of the area of the state, was involved in Oregon. All but one million acres of this land is in the southeastern part of the state.

Potentialities Disputed
In speaking of this land in south eastern Oregon, F. N. Kavanagh, assessor of the forestry department, said improper use of the lands had prevented natural reforestation. If this land is restored to its original condition, he said, it could be capable of supporting 200,000 cattle and 500,000 sheep. J. D. Billingsley of Ontario, state senator from Harney, Grant and Malheur counties, disagreed with Kavanagh and questioned the value of the lands.

John E. Cresswell, president of the Klamath Falls chamber of commerce, said some of the present land in Klamath county would require five years to restore.

Rhea Egan, state engineer, said improper reforestation of the lands involved was not an extensive as to require a massive, elaborate, and expensive job of reforestation.

17 YEARS APIECE
FOR DRUG PEDDLING
KING AND HELPER

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 24.—Arrested "Black Tans," Pasadena alleged king of dope peddlers on the Pacific coast, and his aide, William Levin, were each sentenced to thirteen years in federal prison by United States District Judge A. P. S. Sorensen today. Each also was fined \$24,000.

Parmanini and Levin were convicted yesterday on five counts of violation of the federal narcotic laws. The jury deliberated only forty minutes in assessing the penalties.

Judge Sorensen permitted two counts to be merged. Attorneys for both men were active of litigation to appeal to the federal court.

Because the sentences on counts three and four will run concurrently, Parmanini and Levin actually will serve only 17 years in prison.

SENATE VOTES TO
KEEP HIDES, SHOES
ON THE FREE LIST

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—The senate today rejected the Odde proposal to increase the tariff on hides above the ten per cent ad valorem rate carried in the Hawley-Smoot bill. Hides are now on the free list.

The vote was 39 to 21.

The amendment, offered by Senator Odde, republican, Nevada, would have provided specified rates of five cents a pound on green hides and nine cents on cured hides, an estimated protection three or more times greater than that provided by the house and senate finance committee measures.

Pending further action, the 10 per cent ad valorem rate on hides stays in the bill.

Senator Odde then offered a modified amendment to provide rates of four cents a pound on green and eight cents a pound on dried hides and remanded a record vote. This also was voted down, 47 to 30.

Senator Borah, of Idaho, a leader of the western republican independents, who supported the proposed increased rate on hides, moved to eliminate all tariffs on hides, leather and shoes after the hide increase was denied. This proposal carried, 46 to 28.

The westerners, who had fought for a higher rate on hides, turned against any duties for hides, leather and shoes after their defeat.

On another motion by Senator Borah, proposed increases in tariffs on leather bags, baskets, belts, satchels, card cases, pocket books, leather boxes and portfolios were rejected and existing rates restored.

BYRD PARTY
THUS FAR IN
NO DISTRESS

Expedition, Ice-Shackled,
Has Plenty of Food But
Not Enough to Last
Another Winter.

Two Norwegian Vessels in
Ross Sea Ready to Aid
and British Craft
Is Standing By.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—Captain H. H. Ridley, personal representative of Admiral Richard E. Byrd, in a statement published today, said that although an ice pack barred ships of the expedition from reaching the base on the Antarctic ice barrier, Admiral Byrd and his men faced no immediate food shortage.

The statement, published in the New York Times, which is sponsoring the expedition with associated newspapers said:

"While it is true that the expedition is not fully equipped to spend another winter in the Antarctic, there is no immediate shortage of the food supply. There is ample fuel for heat and for operation of the radio. The men are not on reduced rations. There is no immediate prospect that they will be. They are well clothed, comfortably housed.

"In extreme circumstances an adequate supply of whale, seal and penguin will sustain life—but those who might have to rely upon such a diet over a prolonged period would scarcely count it a pleasant experience."

"Admiral Byrd's present position is exactly that of a cool, wise commander taking preliminary precautions for the safety of a numerous and important expedition."

Stefansson's Views
Vilhjalmur Stefansson, noted Arctic explorer, expressed the opinion that the Byrd expedition had a three-to-one chance to come out of the Antarctic this year, but added that being caught by pack ice was as troubling an experience of Arctic and Antarctic explorers that it might be regarded almost as a normal experience.

He said pack ice has caught one-half of the expeditions that have

DIVORCE SEQUEL
TO ELOPMENT OF
MISS GUGGENHEIM

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Jan. 24.—An annulment of the runaway marriage last April of Natalia Guggenheim, heiress to the copper fortune of the Guggenheims, and Thomas Gorman, a London real estate man, has been granted by Supreme Court Justice Joseph Morschauer. It was learned today.

The annulment was granted on the grounds that Miss Guggenheim was not 18 years old when she and Gorman eluded her parents last April 6 after several unsuccessful attempts, and were married. The annulment was brought by Edmund A. Guggenheim, her father.

The marriage of the young copper heiress and Gorman, son of a railroad employee, created considerable stir last spring when it first became known, several days after the ceremony and shortly after Mrs. Gorman sailed for Europe with her parents, leaving her husband behind.

The Guggenheims are said to have opposed the marriage mainly because of the difference in religion of the young couple. Gorman is a Catholic while Miss Guggenheim subscribes to the Jewish religion.

DENTAL EMPLOYEE
ACCUSED OF THEFT
OF \$8,000 IN GOLD

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 24.—Edward Powell, for 14 years an employee of a dental supply company here, was under arrest today charged with theft of \$8,000 worth of gold from the company. Bail was set at \$10,000 on the grand jury charge.

Three children playing in the snow uncovered packages containing the dental gold in a vacant lot adjoining the Powell house. The first package held \$600 worth of gold. Police began excavating and uncovered a 4x1-foot box containing gold worth \$2,000.

Powell denied all knowledge of the cache.

Theft of the gold was reported to police December 26. Detectives said then that someone familiar with the premises must have been responsible for the robbery as all burglar alarms had been avoided, and the safe appeared to have been opened by turning the combination. Powell was the last to leave the office the night before the theft. He declared he had locked the safe.
