NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—Primo Carnera, Venice's fighting champion, will associate his first fight with an one-half inch super structure in Madison square garden tonight with intent to amuse the populace and annihilate "Big Boy" Peterson of Minneapolis, himself no candidate for membership in the midwestern union.

Carnera, whose feet have been compared in size to one of his native city's gondolias, makes his American debut against Peterson which may go ten rounds provided the battlers and the ring stand up under the strain.

Between them the Italian and his American rival weigh in the neighborhood of 500 pounds. Carnera confesses to something like 370 pounds and Peterson's 215 pounds are distributed over a frame six feet four inches high.

Newspaper accounts of Carnera's activities since he arrived here have been devoted chiefly to the size of Carnera's feet, his weight, his appetite and a few other odds of similar import. There has been a tremendous silence as to his fighting ability, if any. Even so he has been made a 3 to 1 favorite to whip Peterson.

The semi-final of ten rounds looms as possibly the best bout on the program. Larry Johnson, sharp shooting Chicago negro light heavyweight who recently knocked out Joe Sekyra in a round, takes on Fred Lehart of Spokane, Wash. Lehart knocked out Phil Mercurio of New York in his first start here not long ago.

Ad Warren of North Carolina takes on Buck Weaver, champion of Kansas, heavyweight, in the first ten.
