## SHORTAGE OF FUEL HALTS DRILLING AT LEEPER DOME WELL

Drilling at Leeper Dome has been temporarily discontinued because of lack of fuel and cannot be resumed until conditions change sufficiently to permit more wood to be hauled to the location. Officers of the company state that funds are on hand to resume drilling as soon as weather conditions will permit and that the present shut-down is only temporary. It was with great reluctance and only through necessity that the drilling was halted, as the showing is reported to be the best since the project was started.

The drill lately has been working in a very hard sandstone formation where only about 2 feet could be made during the 24-hour period. Just before the shut-down, however, the drill dropped through into a soft shale, where the hole was deepened 2 feet in four hours, bringing up unmistakable showings of oil.

Wood for operating the plant has been secured on a hill a short distance away, but the deep snow has made it impossible to secure wood from that locality now. Attempts were made to get trucks through from Sutherlin, but the roads were impassable, so that there was no recourse but to close down until transportation of fuel becomes possible.
