

ROSEBURG SCHOOL GRADS RANK HIGH IN STATE EXAMS

Roseburg high school graduates placed 5th among graduates from 49 schools of the state who participated in the sixth annual uniform placement examinations in English last compiled by Dr. M. E. Smith, dean of basic arts and sciences at O. S. C. from reports submitted by 18 higher educational institutions of Oregon.

The report lists 49 high and preparatory schools which placed in the upper half of the 58 schools of Oregon that sent five or more graduates as freshmen to these institutions last year. The ranking was based on average number of errors made in the comprehensive tests given at entrance time. Roseburg high school graduates, numbering 25, made an average of 29.55 per cent. Pacific Prep college of Newberg took first place with 20 per cent, having, however, only 10 graduates in the examination. Columbia prep was second with 23.39 per cent and 13 pupils. Lebanon, Albany, St. Helena, Medford, Canby and Forest Grove, held the other places in the order named. Roseburg ranked 5th, followed closely by Jefferson high of Portland, Hood River, Lincoln high of Portland, and Graham. Only the first 49 schools are mentioned in the report.

One significant fact was that 23 out of the 49 schools placing in the upper half this year, also rated in the preferred group a year ago. Roseburg was one of the leading schools last year.

gle in accordance with national laws of the country. The spokesman said he was convinced that a just naval proportion would be worked out and the "total" or "global" machinery be built with each power having its equitable part therein. As to naval parity with Italy the French spokesman stressed the opinion that this question had been awkwardly introduced by talking of parity at the outset instead of respective national naval needs. It was apparent that the French continued to hope to discover some solution of the Franco-Italian naval question but as far as they stood on their determination not to grant parity outright.

Barrier to Accord

The Americans, British and Japanese stood by anxiously today as the negotiations between the two countries proceeded; virtually all other conference activity was at a standstill. The remaining powers were hopeful of good results but fully aware of the possibilities of the situation.

The opinion was expressed in authoritative American circles that Italy's demand and France's refusal embodied at this stage the whole crux of the conference. The general impression among the Americans was that the Franco-Italian negotiations were dealing with fundamental points of the relations between the new French regime headed by Andre Tardieu and the well considered continental policies of the Italian dictator, Benito Mussolini. It was believed the discussion went all the way down the line to actual ship construction programs.

There were indications also that an entirely new point in the Mediterranean was being debated, including the possibility of a security pact with other nations in Europe and Spain and Japan-Soviet as participants. The Americans would not comment on this phase of the situation but the British were keenly interested.

False Reports Denied

The British were not the only ones who thought it necessary to deny some of the deductions appearing in European newspapers. At the French headquarters it was declared published reports that Foreign Minister Grandi of Italy had been excluded from recent discussions of the celebrated French memorandum of last December were wholly untrue. It was said some points in the memorandum, relating to the suggestion of a Mediterranean pact, were of interest to Italy and that Signor Grandi was invited to discuss them with the British and French but replied that for the moment the discussion of the memorandum was not necessary for Italy.

A French official spokesman also disclosed that Premier Tardieu was much displeased by inferences in some of the English newspapers that France was trying to torpedo the conference by insisting on a large naval building program. The premier was represented as feeling that such a suggestion was wholly unjustified as the British and others also were planning large navies.

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GARDENS--and Other Things

At any rate, the shortest day in the year has passed a month ago and the days are getting longer. We can hold out till spring now.

In referring to Muddala, or butterfly bush as we call it, the catalog published in the east says, "The top usually freezes back and new growth starts from the root like other perennials." This is quoted just to remind us again of our blessings. With us the butterfly bush is practically an evergreen. Pruning of these bushes, if it has not already been done, is one job that can be done in this kind of weather, and the sooner the quicker for the new growth is starting. They do best when very severely pruned and should be cut back at least one third. I have tried this now all around them and one little white snowdrop opened in the midst of the storm and seems absolutely contented within a few inches of a snow drift. These staunch and faithful winter flowers that stand by you in all kinds of weather should be honored more than they are.

Second thoughts are often better than first thoughts. The Portland Woman's Advertising club proposed the planting of roses along the highway between Portland and Salem as highway beautification work in which it would like to have a part. Dr. Sullivan, who is the leading rose expert in the northwest, spiked the plan by saying, "Planting roses by the roadside is not a practical thing. Somebody must care for the roses. The thing to do is to plant special roses like the wild rose in outside places, and encourage home owners to select roses and put them out at their homes." Wild roses are beautiful, but have become a pest in parts of Douglas county and the highway crews have been hooking cables to them and pulling them out. If they can be kept within bounds they should be left for they are beautiful and they take care of themselves.

Dr. Sullivan would like to see in each yard along the highway from one to three red Imperial Potentilla roses and at least the two pillar roses Paul's Scarlet and Mermald, a light yellow rose. Dr. Sullivan is curator of the Portland Rose Test Gardens.

The Memory Gardens Highway association of Oregon has started its active campaign for highway beautification with the publication of a booklet, "Ornamental Trees for Northwest Highways." Wells Gilbert, Portland, is secretary of the association.

For twenty years the town of Brookline, Mass., has had an official "superintendent of forestry" whose business it is to tell the shade trees what streets they shall live on. His name is Daniel G. Lacy, and as a result of his work Brookline is one of the most beautiful residence cities in America. There are many things to consider in deciding what trees will be most suitable to any given street. Consistently beautiful cities have to be planned. They don't just happen, and the longer it takes a city to wake up to that fact the harder it is to correct its miscellaneous mistakes.
