CALIFORNIA RAGE RIOT CREATES BAD FEELING IN MANILA

(Associated Press Special Wire) MANILA, Jan. 27.—Anti-Filipino riots in California, which have caused widespread discussions in Manila, today had brought threats against Americans. Authorities, however, gave prompt assurance that Americans were in no danger and measures would be taken to prevent any retaliatory outbreaks. Police Chief C. E. Pitts announced that precautions were being taken to guard embassies and strategic points in the city where isolated attacks were possible against individuals but expressed confidence that there would be no outbreaks. Labor leaders joined in the assurances. The Philippine Herald, leading nationalist daily, reported that chiefs of Manila gangs had already held several "conferences" and that cooperation in their "vindication" plan had been decided upon. Soldiers and sailors were to be the special object of the gangsters' attention, the paper said. The chamber of commerce of the Philippines, a Filipino organization, adopted a resolution of protest against the recent anti-Filipino disturbance at Watsonville, Calif., during which a Filipino was killed. Several other student and civic groups also plan protest meetings.

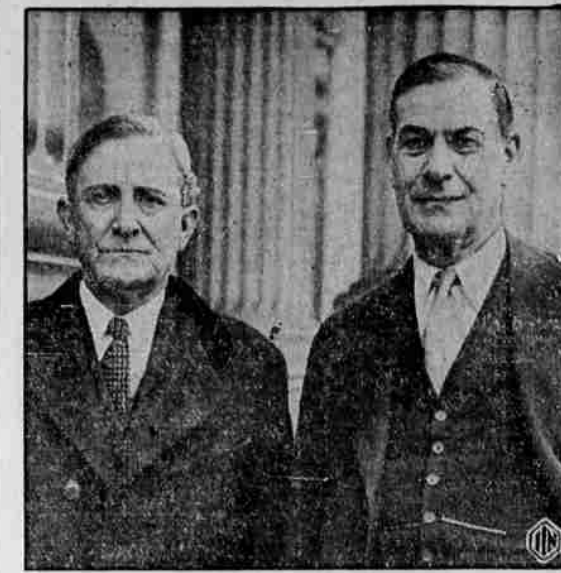

COUNTY APPLIES FOR ANNUAL TAX ON D. & C. LANDS

Application will be made to the federal government by Douglas county for \$159,209.28 under the O. and C. tax refund act, to cover the amount of tax which the re-vested lands would pay in 1930 if on the tax roll. According to the act providing for the tax payments, the lands pay to the counties an amount equivalent to the tax that would have been paid on them had title not reverted to the government. They are carried upon separate assessment ledgers, and are treated in exactly the same manner as other lands of the county, the assessment roll being submitted to the government, where the books are checked for errors, and payment then ordered in accordance with the government's findings.

The act provides that the government shall be reimbursed, with interest, from the sale of the lands. The money received from the government is to be distributed on the same proportion as other taxes: County tax, \$76,961.21; special school, \$17,472.59; special union high schools, \$9,392.17; high school tuition, \$17,158.39; special roads, \$28,891.25; Umpqua highway improvement district, \$8,277.89; Port of Umpqua \$9,115, making a grand total of \$159,209.28. The grant lands in Douglas county have an assessed valuation of \$5,344,528.63. Of the amount to be received by the county, totaling \$76,961.21, the division is as follows: State tax, \$21,078.82; general county, \$22,206.52; roads and bridges, \$14,964.58; market roads, \$8,016.79; indigent soldiers, \$481,011. fire patrol, \$138.96; common school, \$10,074.43. This amount of \$76,961.21, goes into the general county fund, while the balance of the money received from the government is distributed to the special funds as listed.

ALLEGES GERMAN INTERESTS MEDDLE WITH TARIFF BILL

(Associated Press Special Wire) NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—Francis P. Garvan, president of the chemical foundation, in a statement published today, charged that a conspiracy by German chemical interests to influence United States tariff schedules had been aided by Senator George Moses of New Hampshire, Otto H. Kahn and others.

The statement was issued with copies of a deposition which he made for use in the suit brought against him as former alien property custodian charging that he and others tried to defraud the government of \$5,563,546 in the wartime disposition of the assets of the Bosch Magneto company. The suit was dismissed in a federal court in Boston Saturday, where the deposition is on file.

Garvan said in his statement that during ten years he had "assembled evidence of the German penetration of American industry, involving cabinet officers of the Harding regime and Senator Moses of New Hampshire as allies of the German interests in their attempt to regain control of the American situation."

"The only reason I make this statement is because after this case had blown up, the light goes on today. Some of you saw the other day that Otto Kahn was appointed as treasurer for the election of new senators. You did not

associate the fact that his friend and partner, Warburg, is head and front of the American interest in the American interest in Germany in its attempt to destroy our chemical industry."

Mr. Kahn and Felix Warburg are partners in Kuhn, Loeb and company.

The statement also named Mer-ton E. Lewis, former attorney general of New York, as an American official aiding German dye interests. Mr. Garvan said that a salary of \$10,000 received by Mr. Lewis as a special assistant of the United States attorney general was being paid in violation of the federal law as the amount was being paid from German funds held by the alien property custodian by and with the consent of Garvan.

Mr. Garvan said the suit against him was instigated by Gaston B. Means, who later was sentenced to the federal penitentiary at Atlanta.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—Taking note of a charge of Francis P. Garvan, former alien property custodian, that he had sought to assist the German chemical and dye industry, Senator Moses, republican of New Hampshire, is remarked today:

"Mr. Garvan is evidently a very slick man."
