FIVE PERISH WHEN PLANE DIVES, BURNS

Dictator of Spain May Be Told to Quit

Fate of Primo de Rivera's Government Hanging in Balance as Unrest Grips Country.

BURNING SHACK TAKES LIVES OF SEVEN PERSONS

FREDERICK, Colo., Jan. 28.—Seven persons were burned to death in a fire that broke out today in a two-room shack near the Slope mine. Mrs. Paul Martinez, her five children, ranging in age from 15 months to 15 years, and a miner named Ernest L. Newton lost their lives. Newton discovered the fire, broke into the shack through a window and was burned to death trying to rescue the family.

The fire is believed to have started from an overheated stove. The father of the family was at work in the Slope mine, on a night shift. Newton, 34, is survived by his wife.

LARCENY CULPRIT ALLOWED TIME TO AID HIS FAMILY

John Edward Thomas, held in the county jail for the past two weeks on a charge of grand larceny, was allowed to plead guilty to a charge of petty larceny in the justice court today. He was sentenced to serve 12 days in jail, but as he has already been confined for 12 days, he will have only thirty more days to serve. Taking into account the fact that Thomas' family is destitute, Justice Hawkins ordered that the sentence should not become effective until February 28, giving the man time to arrange for the care of his dependent wife before re-entering jail. In the event, however, he does not provide support as required by the court, he will be placed in jail prior to the 28th. He was arrested for taking furniture from a home where he was living as a tenant.
