

28 COUGARS SLAIN IN OREGON WILDS DURING DECEMBER

Hundreds of Deer Saved in
Douglas, Lane Counties;
Sportsmen Help to
Feed Pheasants.

To William Clark, of Oak Ridge, Lane county, goes the cougar killing laurels for the month of December. He had already made claims for nine bounties of \$25 each to the state game commission, with several days yet to go in the month. Harold Clifford, state game warden, estimates that Clark's activities with dogs and gun during December alone have saved more than 400 deer to the state. Bud Kinley of Fall creek also hung up a good record as a cougar exterminator when he bagged five, A. F. Peplot of Sutherlin, Douglas county, scored a kill of four and Charles Pugh of Elsie, same county, bagged three. So far a total of 28 cougars has been killed during the month.

Cougar Cleverness
Stephen Horeney of Clatsop county, with a partner and without the aid of dogs bagged four cougars last week and in so doing, learned something about the big cats. With his partner he was following the tracks of the animals. After a time they found themselves traveling over the deep snow in a circle. Horeney dropped over to one side and let his partner go on the trail. Presently he saw a cougar following his companion's tracks. He had no difficulty in killing the animal. This performance was three times repeated. The fourth cougar was wounded and took flight. The hunters followed him through the snow and finally brought him down.

The cold weather, with its snow, has brought the deer down to lower levels. Cougar have followed them and thus afforded hunters a better opportunity for kills.

Game Birds Saved
In its efforts to provide feed for the game birds that were suffering extremely during the cold weather the state game commission received the hearty cooperation of sportsmen's organizations throughout Oregon as well as of scores of citizens. Already several thousand dollars have been spent by the commission in purchasing and distribution of grain to starving birds. A great many ducks that were held here during the cold weather because of previous feedings made by private clubs were left to the mercy of the elements and stood in grave danger of perishing until relieved from hunger by the action of the commission. Reports from southern Oregon indicate that in spite of severe weather game birds have not suffered. In those sections of the Willamette valley and southern Oregon where there were deer signs Chinese pheasants have had difficulty in surviving. Deer have not been hurt.

Flyer Eager for Revolt
BUENOS AIRES, Jan. 28.—Die patches to La Nacion from St. Juan de Los Rios, state that Ramon Franco, noted Spanish flyer, arrived at Cadix, Spain, today to plane carrying instructions for starting a revolutionary movement against the Spanish dictatorship.

The directorial board of the "casa del pueblo" or house of the people, in Madrid, has decided to support the movement, the dispatch asserts, adding that the movement has ramifications in the south and north where troops are quartered.

Thus far no movement had broken out.

Major Franco, who has been in difficulties with the Primo de Rivera regime since the failure of his trans-Atlantic flight last summer, was arrested on charges of "anti-government utterances" on December 17 in Madrid, and was released the next day.

He had been disciplined in connection with his trans-Atlantic flight attempt and removed from the air service to the infantry, his original arm of the service. In the autumn of 1929 he published a book about Spanish aviation service which was suppressed.

Noted March Recalled
In the quelling of the Sioux under Sitting Bull his regiment penetrated the hostile country only a few weeks after the Battle of Little Bighorn. In the relief of Fort Phil Kearney he marched his men hundreds of miles in the dead of winter with temperatures 10 to 20 degrees below zero, attaining his goal without the loss of a man although every horse in the outfit was sacrificed. He was breveted a lieutenant colonel for gallant services in action against the Indians at Miners Delight, Wyo., May 4, 1876. He retired May 23, 1896.

General Gordon was born in Franklin county, Pa., May 23, 1832. He was educated in public and private schools. His first wife was Ann E. Hughes of Lewisburg, Pa., who died in Washington in 1911. Later he was married to Mrs. Belle Voder Fleming, a descendant of Nancy Lincoln—Lincoln's mother—and the widow of Colonel Robert I. Fleming.

menting on dispatches from London saying Great Britain had announced suspension of construction of her two newest cruisers, Senator McKellar, democrat, Tennessee, declared in the senate today: "They haven't cancelled anything. These ships never have been started."

Reading newspaper accounts saying the British had announced cancellation of work on the two cruisers as a "friendly gesture," McKellar said this was the second time this "gesture" had been made but that work never had been started on the ships.

The first time such a step was reported, McKellar said, was when Prime Minister MacDonald visited the United States and after his conference with President Hoover, "It seems to me," he asserted, "that Senators Reed and Robinson, (two of America's delegates to the naval conference) will see to it that they are not misled by any such falsehood and claptrap as that."

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**NO SIGN OF LIFE
SEEN IN FLOODED
INDIANA REGION**

EVANSVILLE, Ind., Jan. 28.—Uncertainty as to the fate of hundreds of Posen county residents isolated by southwestern Indiana flood waters held the attention of relief workers today.

National guard aviators, flying low over many houses found no evidence of life where just a day or two before they had been crowded by hand waving. They expressed belief that recession of the swollen streams may reveal dead bodies in the homes. Chimneys from where smoke had been seen rising, were reported not operating.

Other persons, however, were more optimistic. They believed that the drifting planes offered no more thrill to the unfortunate, and they did not bother to rush outside and greet them.

The aviators flew over the territory between Evansville and Vincennes and Evansville and Shawneetown, Ill.

NON-SUIT RESULTS IN ECHO OF CRIME OF DE AUTREMONTS

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 28.—On motion of the plaintiff a voluntary nonsuit was granted in Judge McNary's court today in the suit brought by H. C. Young against the Southern Pacific railroad. Young brought action for \$50,000 damages, based on alleged false arrest in connection with the Astoria train robbery in the Black you tunnel in 1924.

Attorneys for the Southern Pacific said no settlement had been made out of court and that the railroad company was prepared to fight the claim had it gone to trial.

In his complaint Young declared Maurice Cottrell and W. C. Chandler, private detectives for the railroad, and Ralph Jennings, sheriff of Jackson county, arrested him at Grangeville, Idaho, in 1927, took him to Medford, Ore., and questioned him under third degree methods as to the whereabouts of the three De Autremont boys.

Young also contended that the detectives caused him to be held in connection with a stolen highway robbery by the "Oregon" Jones gang.

When the De Autremonts were arrested, Young said he was released without explanation or compensation, and that the detectives "broke up his home, caused him to lose his household and made him an outcast."

Attorneys for the railroad declared that Young was ever held in connection with the De Autremont case and that railroad detectives had no part in his arrest.

LILY EXPERT TELLS OF PLANTING AND SOIL PREPARING

By J. ROBERT McKAY

Acting upon the advice of Mr. Brand, I shall devote this week's space to the subject of soil preparation and planting directions.

The first point to consider in the culture of lilies is drainage. While some varieties of lilies require more moisture than others, they must all have good drainage.

"Good drainage," says Mr. McKay, "means that the soil must be loose and drained in the following manner: Dig the lily bed to a depth of at least eighteen inches. Two feet would be better. It should be from eighteen to thirty six inches wide, depending upon the number of bulbs to be planted. The top soil must be placed aside and returned to the top of the bed later unless a complete change of soil is to be made. It would not cost very much to place a three or four inch tile in the bottom of the trench. However, good drainage made by placing about six inches of coarse gravel in the bottom of the trench. The gravel may be used with the tile, too. Then to loosen the rest of the soil a liberal amount of leaf mold, sand, sandy loam, peat moss, a little very fine gravel and I believe best of all well rotted wood, may be added. Any one of these in sufficient quantity should give good drainage."

In finishing the filling of the bed, leave the soil raised four to six inches. It will settle some and should still be raised slightly. If the bed is to be wintered it will help to place boards over it in such a way as to drain the surplus water away from the bed.

Planting: Most catalogues give the proper depth to plant, shade requirements and methods of planting. If in doubt as to the proper

BRITISH FREIGHTER LOST OFF FRANCE

BORDEAUX, France, Jan. 28.—After many hours of heroic rescue work, a life-saving crew from St. Jean de Luz got a line aboard the hull of the British freighter Kneeworth, which ran on a reef near Biarritz during the night and broke in two.

Several members of the crew were brought ashore by the breeches-buoy, and the life-savers were getting them off this afternoon at the rate of one every fifteen minutes under difficult conditions. In all the crew consisted of 21 men and two women, who had taken refuge in the forward part of the ship. One sailor was swept overboard and drowned when the freighter struck the reef.
