

BEAN GROWERS WIN FEDERAL O. K. FOR MARKETING PLAN

(Associated Press Local Wire)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—The federal farm board today approved a plan for a national association to be in charge of marketing dry beans which were submitted by representatives of cooperatives in the bean industry.

Officials of cooperatives from seven states meeting with the farm board presented a tentative plan for the National Bean Growers' Marketing association to be incorporated with a capital of \$1,000,000.

After the meeting, Joe Plummer, president of the Colorado Bean Growers' association, said members of the board expressed hearty approval of the proposed marketing association.

He said cooperatives in Wyoming, California, Colorado, Montana, New Mexico, Idaho and Michigan had agreed to join the national association and that New York growers probably will come in later. The association, Plummer said, will have no immediate need of a facility loan from the farm board. Details of the setup, he said, have not been completed.

NEW ENDORSEMENTS GIVEN RAILWAY LINK

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Additional support of the proposal of the Great Northern and the Western Pacific railroads to connect their lines by constructing a line between Klamath Falls, Ore., and Redding, California, was given today by three western state organizations.

They were the Arizona corporation, public utilities commission of Colorado, and the public utilities commission of Idaho, all of which asserted the additional transportation facilities should be permitted.

ter many unemployed white men have been stranded here, unable to find employment in the fields. Such a situation, they assert, might lead to serious trouble without utmost caution on the part of police.

The attitude of the Filipino leaders during the last week, when several assaults were made upon individual islanders, has been of the best, the police said. They have acted with admirable restraint and have cooperated with city officials in preventing friction.

Independence Argued

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Recent labor riots on the west coast involving Filipinos were said in the senate today by Senator Tydings, democrat, Maryland, to present ample grounds for the granting of Philippine independence in the near future.

Conceding that Filipinos have a perfect right to come to the United States, Tydings said this country already had race questions on its hands and Philippine immigration would make this problem more difficult as long as freedom of the islands was pending.

The immigration policy under which Japanese and Chinese are excluded and Filipinos are permitted entrance into this country was described as "absolutely illogical" by the Marylander.

Press accounts, Tydings said, show the relations between the Filipinos and whites on the Pacific coast are far from cordial. Citing the recent trouble at Watsonville, Calif., he asserted if an American workman was shot in a similar dispute to the Philippines the American government probably would send the army and navy there to preserve order.

Survivor of Monitor- Merrimac Battle



Old "Caph Bill" Fontess, eighty-five years old, recalls that red-letter day in American history when ironclad warships came into their own in the battle between the confederate Merrimac and the federal Monitor. As a "powder boy," Fontess had brought up loads of explosives to fire the shots which sank the federal gunboats, Minnesota and Cumberland within a few days of the encounter with the Monitor. The Portland furniture retailers discovered that 78 per cent of the replies to the questions answered that they read furniture advertising but that they are more impressed by a quality and description appeal than they are by bargain price offers. The average furniture purchases per family per year in the Portland area was ascertained from the questionnaire to be \$251. Portland furniture retailers will, as a result of this survey, revamp their advertising and sales methods.

Cost Basis Given

For many years the various lines of retail businesses were in doubt as to just what per cent of their total sales they should spend for advertising. The Harvard school of business research has made an exhaustive study of this subject and Mr. May gave the results of the study in the form of percentages for the various types of business represented in Roseburg. A rule of thumb of arriving at it, he said, is that with only two or three exceptions it has been observed that an average business should spend for advertising just about as much as is spent for rent.

Mr. May talked for an hour and then the meeting was opened to discussion and questions were invited. Many new points of interest were brought out in the discussion and Mr. May quoted further from his fund of data on merchandising and advertising problems with reference to local newspaper advertising were brought up and discussed. After the meeting was adjourned, little groups formed in the hotel lobby and talked over their marketing problems.

Furniture Men Wise

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 29.—Furniture dealers from eleven western states and Hawaii attending the second semi-annual western retail furniture conference and the 30th semi-annual furniture market week, today formally adopted a sales formula. It reads:

"People are becoming furniture minded, and newspaper advertising is the most efficient method of increasing interest and attracting customers."

More than 1,000 dealers are attending the conference, viewing spring style furniture exhibits filling the eight floors of the San Francisco furniture exchange, and making plans for style showings of furniture in retail stores March 6, 7 and 8.

that department of justice agents had inquired into the conduct of J. P. C. Herbert, prohibition administrator in Montana, or had watched the office of Senator Borah or any member of congress, was made in a statement today by Attorney General Mitchell.

"Someone has been misleading Senator Borah," the attorney general said. Borah had said in the senate that he understood justice agents had investigated Herbert's activities while he was stationed at Baltimore and Borah's secretary had been told that department of justice agents had been watching the Idaho senator's office following his recent attack on prohibition enforcement.

"No department of justice agent or employee has 'watched' or followed Senator Borah, or any other member of congress," the attorney general said. "Any sort of espionage upon members of congress or their offices by this department is unthinkable and utterly repugnant to the sense of propriety of every official in this department."

"If anyone has been to Senator Borah's office representing himself to be an agent of the department of justice," Mitchell said, "I think in fairness to this department he should disclose the name of that person. I have sent Mr. J. E. Hoover, director of the bureau of investigation of this department, to state these facts to the senator and ask his aid in finding who is masquerading as a department of justice agent."

Repeal Pleas Dated

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Chairman Graham of the house judiciary committee announced today that hearings would begin before his group February 12 on seven measures for the repeal of the 18th amendment.

"This will be the first time since the enactment of the eighteenth amendment that such a course has been taken by the judiciary committee. Many efforts have been made by the wet bloc in the house to have hearings opened on measures to repeal the amendment but heretofore they have failed."

The move by some congressional wets looking to a concentrated drive for 275 beer, was met today by notice from the drys that they were not interested in that as an issue and the test would be only on the major question of prohibition or no prohibition.

Senator Borah, of Idaho, one of the dry leaders, dropped his war with the prohibition enforcement officers long enough today to condemn the movement by some house wets for 275 beer as failing to meet the issue.

"That wouldn't help the situation at all," he said. "Such legislation wouldn't settle any of the questions we now have before us. It would merely add a little aroma to your drink."
