

DEVICE SAVES TIME IN ASCERTAINMENT OF TEMPERATURE

Installation of a telethermograph, an instrument for recording temperature electrically, has been completed at the local weather bureau office. This device is a great labor saver for the meteorologist, as it makes it unnecessary for him to climb the tower each time he desires a report on the temperature.

The device is based upon the variation of resistance in an electric coil as a result of temperature. Resistance in a coil becomes greater as temperature increases, and the instrument is so arranged that by a simple manipulation the change in resistance is transformed into a reading in degrees, enabling the observer to secure easily the exact reading at any particular time.

Mr. Fletcher receives many calls at the office each day regarding the temperature, and it is either necessary for him to go to the roof and climb the tower, or else ask the questioner to wait until the next observation period. This device, however, makes it possible for him to provide such reports without leaving his office.

The instrument was provided as special equipment for aviation purposes, as the local office is rapidly becoming an important link in the weather bureau chain of stations providing information for fliers.

Yesterday, Mr. Fletcher reports, was the first day since January 5 that the temperature has been above normal. For a period of 24 consecutive days, the longest such period on record, the mercury has been several degrees below the normal, but the report for yesterday shows a departure of 8 degrees above the normal for that day.

STRANGLER LEWIS, SEEMINGLY BEATEN, DEFEATS SARPOLIS

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 29.—What promised to be one of the greatest heavyweight wrestling matches ever seen here had an unfortunate ending last night when Dr. Karl Sarpolis, wrestling physician of Cleveland, succumbed to an endless number of Ed (Strangler) Lewis' vicious headlocks and rabbit punches, after suffering injuries when he went through the ropes while trying for his flying body scissors specialty. Sarpolis finally succumbed, lying prone on the mat and had to be carried from the ring. After an examination, his ambulance was summoned and he was taken to a hospital for an x-ray examination.

Sarpolis had taken the first fall with his flying scissors and it seemed as if nothing could stop him from being returned the winner. After 20 minutes wrestling for the second fall, Sarpolis attempted a flying scissors, but Lewis sidestepped and the doctor crashed heavily on the boards. He was stunned, but gamely came back. He was an easy victim for Lewis, but in spite of his weakened condition, wriggled out of at least a dozen headlocks before he collapsed.

Sarpolis was the aggressor throughout and forced the wrestling at every turn. He used his flying body scissors to good advantage as well as a standing wristlock.

In a 30-minute preliminary Farne-Vance took one fall and a decision from Arnold Lesser. Jack Mitchell and Ray Lyness went 15 minutes to a draw in a special event.

SEARCH FOR GIRL ONLY LATE PHASE OF RACIAL CLASH

WATSONVILLE, Cal., Jan. 29.—Santa Cruz county authorities were continuing a search in this district today for Carrie Victoria, 16-year old white girl, who disappeared from her home Monday night and was believed in hiding with Filipino lettuce pickers.

Miss Victoria, the daughter of a lettuce farmer, was ordered to leave a Filipino bunkhouse by Elmer Struve, neighboring farmer, but she slipped back to the lettuce pickers and has not been seen since. Authorities carried their search into the bunkhouses.

The sheriff's office reported all quiet in the Watsonville area, where racial disturbances recently flared up. Only two extra deputies are now being used for night patrol work.

CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—Paddy Harmon, builder of the Chicago stadium, aspires to be sheriff of Cook county.

Petitions were in circulation today in Harmon's behalf so he could become a candidate on the republican ticket. Harmon has a

host of political friends as a result of his activities in athletic promotion, including six-day bicycle racing. He recently retired as president of the Chicago stadium corporation.

Brown Fighters Barred
VALLEJO, Calif., Jan. 29.—Notice to remove Filipinos from boxing cards "to prevent further ill feeling and possible serious trouble" was received from the state boxing commission yesterday by Victor Berry, Vallejo prizefight promoter.

Berry had two Filipinos booked on his card tonight at the Vallejo auditorium. He said they would be removed immediately and substitutes sent into the ring.

The commission's order followed recent demonstrations by whites against Filipinos in several parts of California.

Lowman Is Defender
Assistant Secretary Lowman of the treasury, in charge of the prohibition enforcement, has defended Herbert against the charges reported by Borah and also by Senator Wheeler of Montana.

In speaking in the senate Monday, Borah said if the report he had received on Herbert was true he had no business "in Idaho or anywhere else outside of a penitentiary."

It was said Flynn made his report on Herbert to Borah during the holidays. Shortly thereafter Herbert was transferred from Idaho to the Montana-Idaho district. It was after this that Wheeler, a democrat, and Borah, a republican, spoke up.

Oklahoma City, Okla., Jan. 29.—Twenty-two of the 102 officials and residents of Pottawatomie county charged with conspiracy to violate the national prohibition act, pleaded guilty here yesterday when trial of the case was called.

Federal officials announced that 44 of the defendants were fugitives, leaving only 35 to stand trial.

Marion Fuller, former chief of police at Earlsboro, and a defendant, who had been relied upon by the government as one of its chief witnesses, died Saturday in jail under mysterious circumstances.

Among those pleading guilty was Homer S. Knappenberg, former mayor of Earlsboro, one of the oil field towns in Pottawatomie county alleged to have been flooded with liquor with the connivance of local authorities.

Three latest police information concerning his activities connected with him "Miles Pike" Helmer and vice gambling interest on the west side.

Witnesses said the gunmen fired from a distance of three or four feet. They took careful aim and continued firing until Genaro fell.

"Genaro undoubtedly was shot as the result of racketeering," said Lieut. William McCarthy of the detective bureau. "But it will be hard to discover which of his numerous enemies were responsible."
