

NAVAL SLASH BASIS UP TO COMMITTEE

Question to Be Settled Is
Tonnage by Classes of
Ships or Reduction
in Aggregate.

Italy Reserves Privilege
of Renewing Fight for
Parity; Compromise
Offer Made.

LONDON, Jan. 30.—The entire
question of how to measure naval
power—whether by total tonnage, or
by tons in separate categories—
a problem which has vexed naval
limitation negotiations for years,
was put today in the hands of a
special committee by the London
naval conference.

This plan of treatment was
adopted on the motion of Secretary
Stimson, American delegation
head, at a full session of the con-
ference permeated by a general
willingness to compromise, but
marked nevertheless by plain ex-
pressions of diverse national view-
points.

Italy's Reservation

The secretary of state's propo-
sal was accepted unanimously al-
though Italy gave notice that she
felt her claim for parity with

France should have precedence
and that she would accept the de-
cisions regarding limitation meth-
ods only on condition that she
have a day in court later.

The Italian dissent was present-
ed in pungent phrases by Dino
Grandi, Italian foreign minister,
known by everyone to speak the
full determination of Premier
Mussolini. He declared that while
the whole party question might
be left aside, Italy was willing that
the physical terms of limiting na-
vies be considered.

In the end, therefore, Secre-
tary Stimson's motion had a unani-
mous vote.

French and U. S. Views

The French compromise plan
was presented by Andre Tardieu,
the arrangement he proposed per-
mitting shifting to a limited ex-
tent of tonnage from one class to
another to satisfy national needs
within the total tonnage allowed.
Neither he nor any other of this
morning's speakers mentioned any
exact figures.

Hugh S. Gibson, American am-
bassador to Brussels and veteran
of the abortive Geneva conference,
detailed to the conference how the
United States had always stood
for definite limits in each cate-
gory, but now, not to stand in the
way of negotiations not to impose
its will on other nations, was
ready to consider the French
compromise.

Under Secretary Stimson's pro-
posal, the original plan of a steer-
ing committee of two delegates
from each country was scrapped.
In private discussions the propo-
sition of British representation
on such a committee had been
raised sharply. In view of the
presence here of representatives
of all the dominions.

The committee members now
actually will be named by heads
of the delegations and operate
through them with the unanimous

It was not considered likely
that any of the delegates would
serve on the committee, which

Great Britain, (1) The system
of naval limitation by categories.
(2) Determination of lev-
els of total tonnage of the sev-
eral countries.

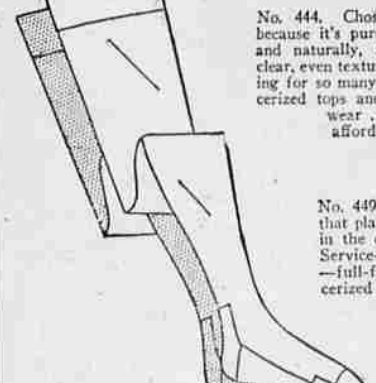

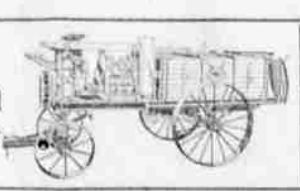
