## MEXICAN GETS SUIT; TAXPAYERS STAND THE COSTS

**GLENDALE, Jan. 31.**—When Tony Hernandez, a self-proclaimed prize fighter who until recently has been employed as a laborer with a Southern Pacific express gang in Cow Creek canyon, "borrowed" a nice new suit of blue clothes and a new hat from Jesse Alire, another Mexican living at Reuben, he evidently did not think it necessary to say anything to Alire about it before he went to Medford. Two days later Mr. Hernandez was sprung from Medford in the custody of Sheriff George F. Olinbaugh because of a warrant sworn out by Alire charging larceny.

At a preliminary hearing before A. G. Charles justice of peace, Hernandez pled guilty and was bound over for trial.

Hernandez engaged Attorney George A. Jackson to defend him. A few minutes before the trial commenced the services of Sheriff Smith, a Cow Creek judge, were called as "prosecuting attorney." Jackson demanded a jury trial for his client and also some delay a jury was empaneled comprising Clarence E. Ulmer, J. W. Barton, Charles F. Kaiser, J. W. Dayton, Lory Miller and H. Lystal.

A certain mysterious woman and a jealous lover were alleged to be the cause of the crime, and the jury, during the course of his testimony, as probable and partial causes of his arrest and troubles. The entire court as well as the audience appeared very much disappointed when this bit of testimony failed to materialize into something definite and spicy.

This bit of testimony, however, served the purpose of confusing the main issue at trial so that when the case was given the jury they disagreed. Two jurors voted for acquittal and four stood pat for conviction.

The case against Hernandez was dismissed. Alire got his hat and suit back; Glendale had an attorney's overcharge; and the taxpayers foot the bills.
