FORESTRY SERVICE TO CELEBRATE 25 YEARS' PROGRESS

A quarter century in the development of forestry and conservation of the nation's natural resources will be called up for review when the U. S. forest service of the department of agriculture celebrates in February the twenty-fifth anniversary of its establishment. The Portland office of forest service announces.

On February 1, there is to be a national broadcast of an anniversary meeting in Washington, D. C. Talks by Gifford Pinchot, chief forester from 1905 to 1910, and Col. Henry S. Graves, chief forester from 1910 to 1929, will be broadcast from 3:00 to 4:00 o'clock, eastern standard time.

On February 1, 1905, the forest service was created in its present form through the merging of the old bureau of forestry of the department of agriculture and the forestry division of the U. S. general land office. Although forestry received the attention of the federal government as early as 1876, it was not until the present forest service came into being that a rounded national policy of forestry was developed and the work began to go forward with long-range objectives. Forest officers of Oregon and Washington have played an important part in this progress.

In the 25 years of its existence, the U. S. forest service has had a colorful history. "Old-timers" in the service recall their part in helping to bring to an end the bitter range wars between the cattle men and sheep men over the use of the western ranges, the early fights to save the public forests for the use and benefit of the public, and the struggle of former days to establish scientific practices and sound administration on the national forests in the face of antagonism. The service has gone through several bad fire years, among which 1910 and 1929 were outstanding.

In the 25 years the forest service has developed into an organization which today has nearly 3,700 public servants, permanently on its rolls, and employs in addition to this personnel some 2,500 forest guards each year during the fire season. The service administers as a public property 150 national forests with an aggregate net area of nearly 160,000,000 acres. Cooperation with the states in fire protection has been extended to afford some degree of organized protection to nearly two-thirds of the entire forest area of the country. The management of timber lands for continuous production is receiving increasing attention as a commercial proposition.

CANADA ARRESTS BROKERS ON CHARGE OF STOCK FRAUDS

TORONTO, Jan. 31.—The last of the brokers, against whom charges of conspiracy to defraud have been laid, surrendered to police today. He was John W. Wray of the A. E. Mooney Company, Ltd. Bail was set at \$100,000.

Thirteen persons are now under arrest, three of them held as material witnesses, while warrants have also been issued for I. W. C. Soloway and Harvey Mills of Soloway Mills and company. It is understood the warrants against Soloway and Mills will not be executed, however, pending the outcome of the trial at Calgary, Alberta, where they are appearing today on charges of conspiracy preferred against them in connection with trading on the stock exchange in that city.

Thousands of investors in mining securities having margin accounts with the five large concerns involved in the arrests awaited business on the standard stock and mining exchange today with anxiety.

Operations of the "big five," as the stock brokers concerned were known in Canada, extended to practically every province in the dominion while a number maintained offices in New York state.
