CARNERA, ITALIAN GIANT, 47 SECONDS FINISHING RIXOU

Frenchman Doesn't Try to Land; Crowd Jeers and Commission Holds Up Money.

CHICAGO, Feb. 1.—Primo Carnera, Italian, big middle man, today was the tentative holder of a 47-second knockout over Elmer Riox, French-Canadian heavyweight—a conquest which will not become official, nor will the boxer receive any money for their effort, until the Illinois state boxing commission is convinced the contest was genuine.

The unveiling of Primo before Chicago eyes, and the attendant ceremony, was quickly accomplished at the Chicago stadium last night. During the 47 seconds of action in the first round, Carnera knocked the French-Canadian to the floor six times, the last time leaving him there, apparently thoroughly chilled with his chin snugged in the canvas.

While no definite charges of anything wrong were made, Fredrick Gardner, a member of the athletic commission, announced the purses of both fighters would be held up pending an investigation into the match.

After Referee Barry had tolled off the count of ten following the 17th knockdown, the spectators, 17,349, who left \$59,625 at the stadium ticket window, booed and hurled folded newspapers and programs into the ring to express their disapproval. Riox was guaranteed \$5,000 for his share of the entertainment, while Carnera's cut amounted to about \$17,000.

Riox spotted the Italian Gollath 634 pounds, and appeared to be extremely nervous as he entered the ring. He did not land a punch during the brief encounter, in fact he did not even attempt to throw a glove at Primo. His defense appeared to be based on the premise that he was safest while on the canvas.

The semi-final bout between King Tut, of Minneapolis, and Bruce Flowers, New Rochelle, N. Y., negro lightweight, went the limit and resulted in a decision for the rugged Minnesota puncher. He knocked Flowers down twice for counts of nine in the seventh round, but Flowers rallied gamely in the last two rounds to outbox Tut. It was a second meeting, the last one ending in a great draw.

Glants who dislike terms offered are Bill Walker, left-handed pitcher who led the league in effectiveness last season; Third baseman Freddie Lindstrom; First baseman Bill Terry and outfielder Edd J. Rouse.

Chicago Cubs would like to buy Lindstrom, but the Giants would not sell him, as he might use the Cubs' money to go to the Yankees. This makes Lindstrom anxious to do as well as he can with the Giants paymasters.

Reports have it that Rouse is the victim of one of the biggest cuts in salary in the history of the game. Rouse, a veteran, finished a three-year contract with the Giants last season at \$22,500 a year. It is understood that the Giants offered him a one-year contract for 1930 at \$7,500.

It has been whispered that a number of the world champion athletes are dissatisfied with the terms offered them. Dizzy Vance probably will not be anxious to take a cut in salary and Burleigh Grimes, according to reports, will give Pittsburgh lots of trouble before he consents to take up spit balls.

CHICAGO, Feb. 1.—Prospect for "holdout" yawns from the offices of the National League champion Chicago Cubs appears slim with only Perry Lay Mainor, the team pitcher in the league to win 20 or more games last season, Clifton Heathcote, utility infielder, and Lewis (Hack) Wilson, unsigned.

AL SINGER GIVES LOAYZA TERRIFIC, 10-ROUND LACING

NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—One more victory had been added today to the already imposing record of Al Singer, Bronx idol, who some experts believe will be the next lightweight champion of the world. Singer, better known as "Doc" Singler, won a convincing victory over Stanislaus Loayza, rugged Chilean, in a slugging battle in Madison Square garden last night.

Eighteen thousand fans gave Loayza a tremendous ovation as he left the ring after an exhibition of gameness seldom equaled before. There was no question, however, as to the decision. Singer won eight of the ten rounds. Loayza one, the tenth, and the second was even.

Singer gave the Chilean a terrific lashing and nearly knocked him out in the third and sixth rounds. In the third and Bronx youngster floored Loayza for a count of nine with a hard smash to the back. Another flurry of right and lefts had the Chilean staggering in the sixth but Singer could not floor him again. Loayza rallied in brilliant fashion in the tenth round and had Singer worried with a half dozen left hooks and right crosses to the chin but the New Yorker boxed his way out of difficulty.

Singer weighed 134; Loayza 126.

HUSKY HOOPSTERS TROUNCE COUGARS

The woman contestant, Mrs. Theda Graham, of McCall, Idaho, with elapsed time of 2:41:15, finished third.

The winner of first place will receive \$2,000. The race will end tomorrow.

GRIMES ORDERED TO PAY WIFE ALIMONY

ROSEBURG SENIOR HIGH BASKETEERS DEFEAT COQUILLE

Fifth Straight Victory of Local Students Keeps Them in Front of League Teams.

Roseburg senior high school basketball team, leading the southwestern Oregon A League by a wide margin, pulled out of a bad hole last night to win its fifth consecutive conference victory, defeating Coquille by a score of 25 to 18 in a very exciting contest. Fighting desperately, with the score against them much of the time, the Roseburg players stood a wild rally that had frantic fans standing on their seats and yelling themselves hoarse as the game entered its final moments.

Both teams over-anxious, missed many good opportunities in the early part of the game, as the players were traveling at such a fast speed that they frequently overshot the basket, or were going too fast to work their plays.

See-Saw Battle
Coquille started the scoring and had a lead of 10 to 0 in the first five minutes. Roseburg's defense strengthened, however, and the local boys worked up to a tie score 6 to 6 as the quarter ended. The visitors, however, broke the tie, but Roseburg evened matters again but Coquille forced into the lead 10 to 9 at the middle of the second quarter and scored another basket by a long shot from the center of the floor. Hoffman, Roseburg center, sent the fans into a frenzy as he dribbled the full length of the floor through the Coquille team for a Roseburg basket that left the score 12 to 11 to Coquille's favor at the end of the half.

The last half was a most exciting period. Coquille took a basket soon after the first throw, but Heller brought Roseburg up again with a fast dribble into the basket. Coquille answered a free throw and Koenig for Roseburg tied the score with a beautiful long, running shot from the sideline. In a mixed moment the Roseburg basket Coquille took another basket, but Hoffman tied the score again with a sensational one-hand shot from the point of a wild dance in the foul line.

Koenig put Roseburg in the lead when he missed a long shot but was in for a follow up shot which was successful.

Roseburg scored again when he dribbled the full length of the floor for a fast shot with two Coquille guards crowding him.

Enter annexed another basket on a fast dribble shot, and Coquille was fouled for backing, giving Roseburg two free throws, one of which was successful.

With two minutes to play Roseburg was leading 25 to 18, and

during that interval both teams tried frantically to score, but without results.

The Coquille team is a fast, rangy squad that exhibits excellent teamwork. Every member of the team is an accurate basket shooter, and their floor work is exceptional. They have a good checking system, and the Roseburg team earned every point made.

Victors' Team Work Ideal
Roseburg's teamwork won a great deal of praise. The boys play as a unit and to pick any member of the team showing ability greater than another is not possible. Heller and Hoffman played a beautiful floor game, breaking up play after play and passing the ball back into Coquille territory. Heller was in the midst of every play and frequently broke up plays that started out like they were going out for scores. Bayles played a brilliant defensive game, and his checking was largely responsible for Roseburg's victory. Koenig, at forward, was high point man, despite the fact that he had two guards riding him constantly, as his reputation is well known to all of the count teams, and guards go into the game with instructions to keep over him all of the time.
