

CLASS DRINKER AS CRIMINAL, DEMAND OF CONGRESSMAN

Consumer Actual Violator,
Bootlegger Merely An
Abettor, Contends
Wet Lawmaker.

Prohibition Act Flouted By
Million of Both Sexes,
Declares Lehlbach
of New Jersey.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—A demand that the drinker of alcoholic beverages be classed as a criminal and that prohibition enforcement agencies be directed against such persons was made in the house yesterday by Representative Lehlbach, republican, New Jersey, who is a member of the wet group in congress.

He said it is those who drink that are "essentially the ones who disregard and defy" the dry law; that the still operator, the rum runner, and the bootlegger were "merely abettors of the violator" and the drinker was the real breaker and the criminal.

Lehlbach, a warm friend of Representative Fort, republican, New Jersey, a dry, who yesterday declared in the house that drinking of home brew was not unlawful under the dry laws, took issue with his colleague. He said:

"It is idle to retort that the act of drinking is not forbidden. Only 99 and 98-100th per cent of such occasions the very presence of the beverage necessarily entailed the commission of one or more acts made felonies by the Jones act, and its possession at the time of its use is declared a crime."

Logic From Wet Angle

Frequently it has been advocated that the buyer of liquor be made equally guilty with the seller but as far as could be recalled at the capitol, Lehlbach is the first to advocate that whoever drinks it should be classed as a criminal. He asserted, as he understood it, the intent and purpose of the prohibition laws was to stop the drinking of alcoholic beverages, adding:

"The persons who drink them are essentially the ones who disregard and defy the legislation on this subject. It is absurd to suggest that they make their own clothing and raise their own food at home. Those who make, sell and transport liquor are merely agents who enable the real violators of prohibition to do so."

Lehlbach said that there were millions of violators of the law in every station of life, and that the still operators, rum runners, bootleggers, and their ilk, were merely

the abettors on the violators.

"Millions of Violators"

"The prohibitionist lays down this proposition," he continued, "prohibition is law, therefore, whoever disregards it is a lawbreaker; whoever breaks one law encourages others to break other laws; hence he is potentially an anarchist. In any event, being a law breaker, he is a criminal. The only trouble with this proposition is that every single premise and conclusion in it is untrue."

"There are in the country millions of men and women who habitually or occasionally are such prohibition violators. Everybody knows this and whoever seeks to deny it, the truth is not in him."

"My own experience differs in no respect from that of the average man who gets around and I have seen laborers, mechanics, merchants, manufacturers, professional men, bankers, judges, both state and federal, clergymen, both of the Roman Catholic and Protestant persuasions, blandly and unconcernedly ignore prohibition."

Individual Right

Lehlbach said legislative authority never has and never would make law and continued:

"The law is made by the people themselves in every day pursuit in their customs, moral beliefs, in their normal lives at home and abroad. True law is acquiesced in by everybody save the deliberate criminal whose hand is against society and all its members. He does not pretend he has a right to disregard the law but chooses to do wrong."

While it is not the fact with the prohibitionist, from the time immemorial mankind has used alcoholic stimulants as a means of lubrication against cares, worries, anxieties and monotony of life. Whether he serves wine to his dinner guests in his home, whether he brews and drinks a make-shift beer, whether he lays down a few beers of home-made wine, whether he keeps a jug of corn or apple in his out bin or lay left, he instinctively feels he is within his personal and private rights and it is nobody's business to invade his life and say him nay. As I said there are millions of him throughout the land."

Blasphemy Charged

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—Representative Schafer, republican, Wis. consin, was granted the unanimous consent of the house yesterday to have removed from the record those portions of a recent prohibition speech objected to today by Representative Brand and other democrats, Georgia.

The resolution, mentioned by Schafer, was held by Crisp and Brand, to be sacrilegious because it was a criticism of Jesus Christ for furnishing wine at a wedding feast.

The resolution first was attributed to the ministerial association of Charleston, W. Va., but Crisp declared he had established it was a falsehood and read a number of affidavits into the record and offered a motion to eliminate the resolution. He added that Representative Schafer, republican, Wisconsin, was "deserving of censure" for inserting "false slander against the Christian min-

ROY STOVER WINS DOG DERBY; WOMAN ENTRANT SEVENTH

TAHOE, Cal., Feb. 3.—Hitcher by \$2,000 and possessor for one year of the Marco Bellman trophy, Roy Stover, veteran musher from McCall, Ida., rested today after winning the second annual Tahoe-Sierra dog derby, the third and final lap of which was run yesterday over the 15-mile snow-covered course between Tahoe and Truckee and return.

Stover sent his team of setters across the finish line to win the annual classic in the elapsed time of 7 hours, 58 minutes and four seconds. He finished first in each of the three thirty mile laps, beating the elapsed time of Fred Prints of Portland, Ore., winner of last year's race, by forty-one minutes.

Second place was won by 17-year-old Delbert Groom, Rigby, Ida., whose elapsed time was eleven minutes behind Stover. Groom negotiated the three laps in 8:9:27. The youth said he would use the \$1,250 second prize money to buy dogs for next year's derby.

Earl Kimball, Ashton, Ida., driving the winning team used by Prints last year, was third. Kimball sent his team over the course in 8:21:33. He won \$750.

Thula Geelan, of McCall, Ida., the only woman entrant, had bad luck with her dogs and finished seventh.
