TODAY'S MARKETS

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 31.—Agricultural supplies have brought another price reduction. The Pacific Cooperative Producers today announced a cut of 25 in all grades, bringing fresh extras down to 21c.

Butter prices were steady, but the undertone was weak.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:

"An abundance of southern fruits and vegetables is now available at Portland, and trading in the wholesale market is good—but at slightly lower prices than those that prevailed last week. About 25 different fruit and vegetable commodities are now on track; track loadings still totaling about 50 cars.

"Cabbage from local storage and from California is selling to buyers as high as \$4.00 per cwt. for best stock. California's heavy early flower shipment is being reduced in price declines on this stock to \$1.50 per cwt. on the Portland market. Imperial valley lettuce, though of excellent quality, also weakened to \$1.75-\$2.00 per cwt. for top grades.

"Demand for tomatoes is very slow, and the market is dull. The first supply other than a few hot-house arrivals is entirely from the west coast of Mexico.

"Hot-house rhubarb from Kammer, Washington, which started to arrive in limited volume 2 weeks ago, is more plentiful; but prices are still high.
