PURCHASE OF NEW FIRE EQUIPMENT FOR CITY PLANNED

(News-Review Douglas County Special)
GLENDALE, Feb. 5.—A request to bank the city's present fire fighting equipment and to replace the old equipment with a lot of new apparatus was made by C. J. Kater and M. E. Corrigan, as representatives of a Glendale chamber of commerce special committee, to the Glendale city council at its regular monthly meeting held at the city hall Monday evening. As the city budget has an allowance of only \$500 for new fire fighting apparatus the proposal by the chamber of commerce representatives was referred to the regular council water committee for its investigation and report.

A report was made regarding opening of First street through to Pacific avenue. The matter was referred back to committee for further investigation.

Mayor Brown announced the appointment of the following standing committees of the city council to serve through the coming year: Committee on water, sewer and fire equipment, Wm. Wunsch, I. H. Smith and J. E. Nelson; committee on streets and city lighting, Hal Moore, E. E. Helcher and C. B. Auer; health committee, Smith and Attala with Dr. A. J. Pavcut as ex-officio member.

A special committee consisting of Nelson, Smith and Wunsch was appointed to investigate the advisability and legal action necessary for the city to foreclose on vacant lots within the city limits that are on the delinquent tax lists.

The duties and hours of the city marshal were discussed and Mayor Brown will probably order the marshal's hours changed from an all night basis to partial day and night service. Another result of this discussion was the decision to enforce hereafter the 12 o'clock midnight closing law affecting pool rooms and dance halls.

The mayor instructed the water committee to confer with J. S. Woodroffe for the purpose of securing a definite proposition from him regarding his water rights on Mill creek and to report this at a special meeting to be held Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock.

The "second row council," so called by a member of the regular council, took place in the evening's proceedings. The matter of marshal's hours, the delinquent tax redemption proposition and especially the fire department equipment were topics selected to free for all discussion between the members of the regular city council and the "second row council."
