Key Protects Health

The decision of Thomas B. Key to withdraw from the field was announced yesterday. In a public statement Mr. Key said:

"I have long cherished the thought that I should like to occupy the office of governor, that I might thereby gratify a personal ambition and also extend to the people still further the benefit of my 27 years' experience in public office, as well as my experience in private business and as a member of several legislative assemblies.

"It is thus with sincere regret that I announce that I have decided not to run for the office.

"I have this decision upon the fact that my progress toward absolute recovery from my recent illness has been somewhat slower during the past month than my physicians and I had expected. I feel also that the stress of the impending political campaign would not only interfere with the minor medical treatment which I still must undergo, but that because of the necessity of such treatment a doubt might exist in the minds of the electorate as to whether, at present, I really have the physical stamina to withstand an arduous campaign and then perform the duties of the governorship.

"I greatly appreciate the confidence reposed in me by the press and by my many friends who have urged me to enter the contest, and I take this opportunity publicly to thank them for their sentiments of good will and for their many kind expressions of sympathy during my recent illness."

crime had a religious motive, but laid it rather to a plot of "Vasconcelistas" as adherents of the defeated presidential candidate Jose Vasconcelos are known.

None of six others wounded by the shots from Flores's gun was injured seriously. One of the six shots fired grazed the ear and scalp of Senora De Ortiz Rubio; another grazed the ear of the president's young niece, Senorita Maria Rosa, while the chauffeur of the presidential car has a bullet wound in his shoulder.

Three bystanders were wounded. One of them, J. Carmen Jimenez, still is in a hospital with a wound on his forehead. Two others whose names were not made public received slight wounds.

Precise information as to just what had happened was lacking for hours after the shooting. First reports that the president's sister and daughter were in the car were rectified with later information that the automobile was occupied by only five persons, the president, his wife, niece, chauffeur and secretary, Senor Chazaro, of whom only Chazaro escaped unhurt.

No Resistance Made

The president had just concluded his first meeting with his new cabinet in the national palace when the attempt was made. As his automobile departed from the palace from the gate of honor a well-dressed young man, standing behind the presidential guards, was seen to lift his arm and fire at the occupants.

A motorcycle policeman, Jorge San Millan, a member of the presidential guards, jumped from his machine and with others overpowered the gunman who offered virtually no resistance and allowed himself to be taken into the palace. The president's chauffeur, meanwhile, despite his injury, speeded the car through the crowd, which hardly knew what had happened, to a Red Cross hospital where the injured were treated.

Bullet Removed

The bullet, which penetrated the president's cheek and lodged in his left jaw, was extracted easily under anesthetic and thereafter the president was removed to his home. His wife, niece and chauffeur also were treated at the hospital and left later for the presidential residence.

The minister of war, General Joaquin Amaro, participated in the questioning of Flores who declared he was a merchant and bore no personal ill will toward Senor Rubio but thought he should be removed from the presidency for the country's good.

He said he was not affiliated with communists and had no religious prejudices but he was allowed to have admitted he was an "Vasconcelista." Despite his denial the government believed the shooting developed from a well-prepared plot of "Vasconcelistas" origin.

City Is Orderly

The investigation into the shooting had assumed wide proportions today but the authorities gave no indication as to what had

been discovered. Troops which patrolled the streets during the night were withdrawn today with the situation completely in hand.

President Ortiz Rubio's house, however, remained under the surveillance of fifty presidential guards.

Meanwhile messages from all parts of the world congratulating the president on the failure of the attempt to kill him and expressing sympathy were received by the government. Many of the messages came from high officials in the United States.

It was learned today that a few hours before his attempt to kill the president Flores asked his hotel proprietor who would succeed Rubio if he should die.

Morrow Sympathetic

LONDON, Feb. 6.—Dwight W. Morrow, American ambassador to Mexico, who is now serving in the American naval delegation, today sent a message of sympathy to President Ortiz Rubio, the message read:

"I am deeply shocked by the report of an attempt upon your life and am thankful to know that it failed. I wish to express my warm sympathy for you and Senora Ru-

bio and my hope for your quick and complete recovery."

Hoover Rejoices

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—President Hoover, through the state department, today communicated to President Ortiz Rubio of Mexico his pleasure that the Mexican chief executive had escaped serious injury when shot yesterday by a would-be assassin.

Mr. Hoover characterized the attack as "cowardly." His message read:

"While deeply distressed to learn of the cowardly attack made on you and your family, Mrs. Hoover and I rejoice with the American people that you and Senora De Ortiz have suffered no serious harm and that you have been spared to carry on your constructive program. Please accept our most cordial wishes for your complete recovery and be assured that the government of the United States earnestly trusts that Mexico, under your wise and able guidance, will enjoy an era of spiritual and economic progress."

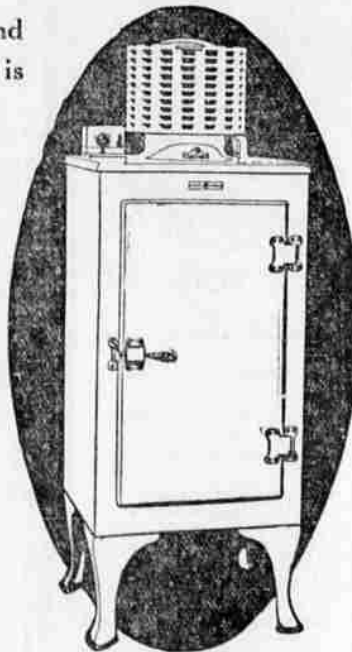
