

COLORADO PRISON RULE CHANGED TO MILITARY BASIS

Board of Corrections Then
Receives Request From
Governor Adams to
Quit Office.

(Associated Press Local Wire)
CANON CITY, Colo., Feb. 6.—A military routine will be instituted at the state penitentiary here immediately upon the dictation of Patrick J. Hamrock, former adjutant general of the Colorado national guard, in an effort to quell intermittent disorders, Charles J. Moynihan, chairman of the state board of corrections, said today.

Action installing Hamrock as special deputy warden under Warden Francis E. Crawford was taken by unanimous action of the board of corrections. It was made plain by Moynihan that the existing administration of the prison would not be disturbed, but that Col. Hamrock would be given a free hand in bringing order and in attempting to prevent recurrence of riots and fires.

Col. Hamrock is a man of wide experience in military affairs, having been commanding officer of the 157th infantry and after the World war in charge of the embarkment for home of American soldiers at Bordeaux.

The action was taken on recommendation of disorders, which last October claimed 13 lives. Lately several incendiary fires have been started in the prison, the last having been started Saturday.

Adm. Board to Resign
DENVER, Feb. 6.—Governor William H. Adams today wired Frank S. Hoag of Pueblo, Charles A. Moynihan of Montrose, and Mrs. Helen Grenfell of Denver, compelling the state board of corrections, demanding that they resign at once.

While saying he recognized he had no authority to discharge the board of corrections, Governor Adams said it is imperative a thorough reorganization be made at once and that any reorganization must begin with the corrections board.

Telegrams were addressed to each member of the board which met today with the announcement that a military routine would be instituted at the prison at once with Colonel Patrick J. Hamrock in command.

The governor's action was seen as an open block to the corrections board's attempt at reorganization within the penitentiary.

COMMUNITY CHESTS
GET HOOVER'S O. K.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—President Hoover, speaking to a group of community chest workers today, declared that community chests represent "our greatest advance in the administration of charity."

"Their great purpose," he said, "is the handling with large vision of the obligations of a whole city to its less fortunate residents."

The development of the community chest, Mr. Hoover added, had assured skill in the administration of charities as well as freedom from prejudice. The community chest also requires support to charity of vital necessity but little emotional appeal.

The address was delivered in connection with a community chest drive now being conducted in the District of Columbia.

termines whether an offense is petty or grave.

"Sixth, trial before a commissioner is in fact, if not in legal dictation, a trial before a separate unordained court, in violation of Article III of the constitution and of the law as interpreted by the United States supreme court in *Caban v. Wilson*.

"Seventh, if the commissioner's court is not a court and the commissioner is not a judge, then the accused is deprived of his liberty by trial without court, judge or jury. That is not 'due process of law' guaranteed by the constitution.

"Eighth, the power of the district attorney to reconvert the identical offense from a misdemeanor into a felony should be accented upon trial by jury is a power dangerous in fact and reprehensible in principle.

"Ninth, the commissioner is not an official of sufficient responsibility to be given the power proposed in this legislation.

"Tenth, violations of the prohibition law are peculiarly offenses which ought to be tried by jury."

BANK OF ENGLAND
RATE OF DISCOUNT
AGAIN LOWERED

LONDON, Feb. 6.—The discount rate of the Bank of England was reduced today from five to four and one-half per cent.

The reduction was due to the recent inflow of gold and improvement of the national monetary situation which assisted recently in reductions of the bank rates of Germany and France.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—The reduction of the rediscunt rate of the Bank of England today to 4 1/2 per cent was regarded in government financial circles as presaging another drop in the rediscunt rate of the New York federal reserve bank.

Generally the New York rate has been one half to one per cent lower than the London bank. The New York rate is 4 1/2 per cent.

LIQUOR SALES POUR
GOLDEN STREAM IN
QUEBEC TREASURY

QUEBEC, Feb. 5.—The provincial treasury of Quebec was crisscrossed today by \$8,043,752 from the sale of liquor during the year 1928-29. It was shown in the eighth annual report of the Quebec liquor commission. To this was added \$1,644,515 in revenue from seizures. It was the biggest year in the history of the commission.

The report of the commission showed gross receipts of \$27,007,430 from sales, with purchases of stock, operating charges and other expenses totaling \$9,629,959. Customs, excise and sales taxes paid to the dominion government amounted to \$9,324,619.

From 1927-28 the turnover to the treasury was \$6,500,000, the previous record. Sales showed an approximate increase of \$3,000,000 in 1928-29 over the previous year.

SENATE REVERSES HOUSE BY VOTING DUTY ON CAMPHOR

Old Guard Holds Rally to
Check Attack on Items
of Tariff—Many
Slashes Made.

Artificially Colored Lard
Substitute Entered on
Tax List as Farm
Aid Measure.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—Reversing a previous vote by which it approved a reduction in the present tariff on synthetic camphor from six to one cent a pound, the senate today approved a duty of five cents.

The house today passed by a vote of 245 to 74 the Hagen bill to include artificially colored cooking compounds under the taxing provisions of the oleomargarine act. The measure goes to the senate.

The bill was amended to provide that it should not be effective until six months after enactment.

Opponents of the measure, which has been before the house in several previous sessions, assailed it as a "backers' bill," while supporters urged its passage as a farm relief measure.

The house resolution to appropriate an additional \$31,400,000 for federal post roads for the current fiscal year was approved today by the senate and sent to the president.

Old Guard Rallies
More than 100 senate old guard republicans held a rally at the capitol today at which participants were requested to keep constant attendance during roll calls on the tariff bill in the senate.

The conference was called yesterday by Senator Watson, of Indiana, the republican leader, after the democrats and republicans independently had succeeded in lowering many duties on chemicals.

Many of yesterday's decisions were by one or two votes and with 100 per cent republican attendance, leaders of that party felt many reductions could be prevented.

A resolution asking the senate interstate commerce committee to make a "searching investigation" of rebating in every form affecting railroads and all common carriers was introduced today by Senator Brookhart, republican, Iowa.

Authorization for an appropriation of \$50,000 for a statue of Theodore Roosevelt on Battle Rock, Port Orford harbor, Oregon, was introduced in a bill introduced today by Senator McNary.

FUGITIVE FOR 3
YEARS ARRESTED

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 6.—Judson Taylor, 40, fugitive for more than three years from Canton, Ohio, where he was charged with mailing a postal card bearing a defamatory epithet toward his sister, has been arrested here by federal officers.

He was found living under a string of financial circumstances with an invalid wife and their three-month-old baby in a small apartment.

Deputy United States Marshal Vincent Mangera said Taylor admitted sending the card to his sister, Emma B. Wetherpoon, said to be the wife of a state senator of Elgin, Oregon. The note is said to have concerned money which Taylor claimed was lost by their mother who was near death at the time. Taylor was indicted Dec. 21, 1925.

MEDFORD PRISONER
TRIES TO ESCAPE

MEDFORD, Ore., Feb. 5.—Jack Bonouche, held in the county jail under three indictments charging robbery and torture with fire, attempted to escape today by building County Jail. He was caught in the stomach with his head.

Bonouche was grappled with Douglas and succeeded in forcing him back into his cell.

Bonouche is alleged to have forced Pat Bohan, junk dealer, to put one foot in a stove while Bonouche was attempting to force Bohan to tell of a money cache.

DANCER DEMANDS
\$30,000 BALM FROM
"AFFINITY" EARLE

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Feb. 6.—Dolores Salazar, Spanish dancer, from the witness stand in superior court testified today that Ferdinand Finney "Affinity" Earle, whom she seeks \$30,000 for alleged breach of promise, informally married her in the garden of his Hollywood home on New Year's eve, 1926, and himself read their marriage vows.

Weeping as she talked, Miss Salazar described the alleged ceremony. "He took me into the garden. He placed a Bible on a bench. We held hands while he repeated the marriage ceremony by heart just as the New Year's noise broke out."

The noted artist, now living with his fifth wife in Paris, has denied the dancer's claims by depositions forwarded from France.

LIONS CLUB PLANS TO BOOST COUNTY'S POULTRY INDUSTRY

Upon the request of J. C. Leedy, county agricultural agent, the Roseburg Lions club is considering a plan to put up a cash prize for the advancement of poultry in this county. Such a request was brought before the club at its meeting last night.

Willard Johnson, president, announced that the suggestion would be taken up at a meeting of the board of directors immediately and expressed the interest of the Lions in anything which will aid the progress of the county. He particularly stressed the importance of the poultry industry. Homer Grov presented the county agent's suggestion.

It was also announced that plans are still under way to secure the use of a Portland radio broadcasting station for the purpose of putting on an hour's program which will have as its central idea advertising this county. Joe Deets is chairman of the broadcasting committee. Money raised in the recent Lions club moving picture will be used to pay part of the expenses of this project.
