COPCO POWER LINES EXTENDED

GLENDALE, Feb. 7.—Power lines of the California Oregon Power company are being extended this week from the present end of the line at the Garrett ranch to the Glendale Junction service station and auto camp and also to the Capitol auto camp located at the foot of Stage gulch hill on the Pacific highway east of this city. Henry Baehner is foreman in charge of this job.

The proposed extension of the power line from the Glendale Junction to Harle service station above Azalea is still under consideration and the prospects of having this line built look favorable, according to a tentative survey of the revenue possibilities made along this route last week. Government officials have expressed a willingness to contribute towards the construction costs of this line because of a proposed aerial beacon on the summit north of the Johns ranch. Until a definite proposition is received from the government a report of the outcome of the survey made last week will be held in abeyance.
