MR. KAY'S RENUNCIATION

ANNOUNCEMENT by State Treasurer Thomas B. Kay that he will not run for governor undoubtedly comes as a relief to many of his sincere friends and well wishers who had feared for him not only injury to his precarious health from the strenuous activities of a campaign but who also foresaw in the situation probability of disappointment for him as a likely result.

This is not the year for a man to run for governor whose health is bad or doubtful. It is not the year for one to run who is old. The death of Governor Patterson is fresh in the public mind. People want a governor in whom there can be reasonable dependence of his serving out his term. And so while Mr. Kay on his record deserves well of his state and while the state in general thinks well of him, it is not likely that he could have won the republican nomination for governor in a field which includes several well qualified aspirants.

The Oregon City Enterprise, whose editor is one of the best informed political observers in Oregon, remarked recently in effect that the entry of Mr. Corbett was likely to work greatly to the advantage of Mr. Hall. This was not a sympathetic utterance, because the Enterprise and its editor oppose Mr. Hall. But however that may be the present situation would seem to place the advantage between Mr. Hall and Governor Norblad, and this is said with full appreciation of the fact that Mr. Corbett is developing up-state strength in greater degree than had been at first generally accredited to him.

The primary campaign is yet young. There may be other entries in the republican gubernatorial race. Developments may occur which will alter the present situation utterly as regards the candidates already in. But in the present aspect of things this writer cannot see how any of the Multnomah aspirants is likely to win.

Attorney General Mitchell says nobody not personally dry will hereafter be appointed to the prohibition forces. That is logical. If the same idea could be carried into our choosing of congressmen and senators there would be fewer news stories from time to time about leaky baggage and freedom of the port at our custom houses.

Samuel Harden Church, president of the Carnegie institute, proposes a liberal party to combat religious dictation in politics. So there is nothing in a name after all.

"David Samoff, who arrived in the United States from southern Russia nearly thirty years ago, and worked as a delivery boy and messenger boy, has just been elected president of the Radio Corporation of America. Mr. Samoff, successor of General James G. Harbord, who became chairman of the board to succeed Owen D. Young. Simultaneously establishment of an executive committee was announced, which will be headed by Mr. Young.

"Mr. Samoff, who was named general manager of the corporation when it was formed in 1919, has been active in that capacity and as its vice-president for several years in developing and co-ordinating the organization's worldwide activities and expanding its interests.

"Bringing to it his experience as commercial manager of the Marconi Wireless Telegraph company of America, he was equipped from the start with the technical knowledge needed to work out a program of pooling of patents which was considered essential to give the United States leadership in the radio field.

"The chief objective of the new organization was to engage in international communications by wireless and to take control of many radio patents owned by General Electric company, Westinghouse Electric company and Manufacturing company, American Telephone & Telegraph company, United Fruit and other organizations.

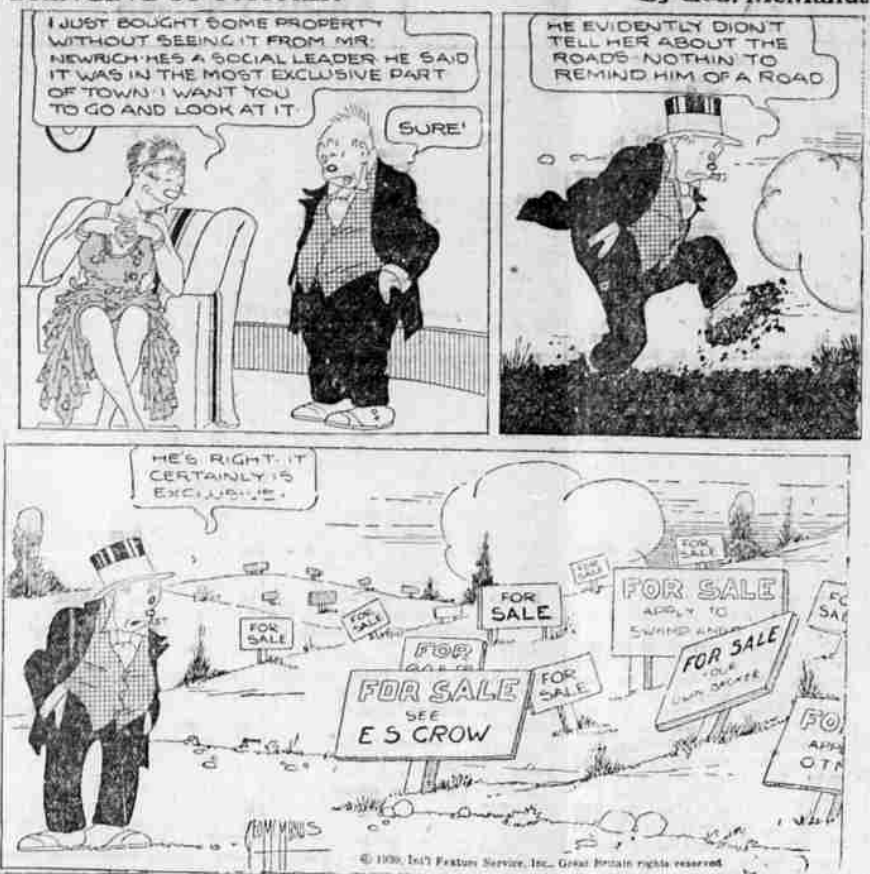

COOKING SCHOOL GREAT SUCCESS DESPITE WEATHER

The News-Review free cooking school came to a close yesterday, the final day being a great success. Despite the rainy weather, the attendance was excellent, with a great many present also from the rural districts.

Miss Cameron devoted the last day to pastry demonstrations, which were of great interest to all present.

The prize drawing was held as usual, many valuable prizes being distributed. At the close of the program the Model Bakery served coffee to all present.

Miss Cameron was asked for a recipe for cooking close salad, while the school was in progress, but did not have an opportunity to demonstrate its preparation. The recipe, however, was promised for publication and is as follows:

Ingredients: 1 cup boiling water, 1 package prepared jelly or table spoonful of gelatin with one-fourth cup of cold water, 1 cup pineapple juice, 1 tablespoon vinegar, one-half teaspoonful salt, 1 cup diced pineapple (drained), 1 cup grated raw carrot, one-third cup pecans, walnuts or almonds.

Dissolve gelatin in water, add pineapple juice, vinegar and salt and then chill. When slightly thickened add fruit and nuts. Chill until firm. This recipe will make six servings.

and rigid inspections, is kept so good that people who buy it are pleased with what they get and keep coming back for more.

HERE is another example, this time from a neighboring state: Only a few years ago Idaho was shipping less than a dozen cases of butter annually to the Los Angeles market. Then Idaho raised her standards of quality so that she was producing a much larger volume of 92 score butter, and immediately her shipments to the Los Angeles market increased enormously.

Idaho couldn't find a market for a small amount of 'POOR' butter, but immediately found an expanding market for a LARGE amount of GOOD butter.

HERE is the moral, and it is a moral that Oregon MUST heed if she is to increase her agricultural production and find a market for the increase:

We must keep everlastingly in mind that people will consume more and more of a high quality product, but that they will consume LESS AND LESS of low quality products. It we will do that, we can increase our markets here in Oregon.

ROSEBURG HIGH BASKETEERS TRIM BANDON, 26 TO 19

Roseburg high school basketball continued their unbroken record of victories yesterday by defeating Bandon high school at Bandon by a score of 26 to 19. Starting from behind in the third quarter with a thrilling rally, Bandon tied the score at the end of that period, but the effort exhausted the players and Roseburg had little difficulty in taking a good lead in the last quarter.

The local players were quite badly handicapped by Bandon's small floor, and the game was quite rough, but there were few fouls called on either team, as all players were clean and sportsmanlike.

Roseburg led at the end of the first quarter, 7 to 4, and was 12 to 8 in the lead at the end of the half. In the third quarter, however, Bandon began opening up with long shots and tied the score 17 to 17. The fast pace, however, could not be maintained and Roseburg went back into the lead in the fourth period.

Roseburg's guarding was particularly good and Bandon secured only two close baskets, making all of their other field goals from the center of the floor.

CHINESE PLAYER STARS IN VICTORY OVER LOCAL TEAM

A little Chinese basketball player named Clarence Chinn, wearing the colors of Roosevelt Junior high school of Eugene, beat the Roseburg junior high team almost single handed in a rough game last night. The Eugene team, with a score of 28 to 8, owed 11 of its points to Chinn, while his floor work and accurate passing were largely responsible for most of the other points.

Small in size and incredibly fast, Chinn was covering the entire floor. With uncanny precision he outpassed the Roseburg players and broke up play after play to dribble the ball into Roseburg territory, and there to maneuver his own players into position where they could get a clear shot, while he drew off the Roseburg guards.

Roseburg was held to three lone points until Chinn went out of the game in the last quarter as a result of an injured hand. The hand was hurt during the football season and has greatly handicapped him in basketball.

As soon as Chinn left the floor the teams were about evenly matched in ability, despite the fact that the visiting players were considerably larger than the Roseburg boys.

The game was very rough, but fast and interesting. Roseburg played a very close checking game, but was unable to get by Chinn on the offense.
