

Glendale Special Election Monday to Decide on Extension of City Water System

COUNCIL PROPOSES RAISING \$16,000 TO INCREASE SUPPLY

New Law Limiting Vote to Taxpayers Only to Be Observed, Although Law Questioned.

Some Displeasure Manifest Because Issue as Given Ties 2 Questions Into One.

(News-Review Douglas County Special.)
GLENDALE, Feb. 8.—A special election is to be held next Monday in Glendale to decide whether or not to bond the city for \$16,000 for the purpose of improving and repairing the present municipal water system, making extensions and increasing the source of water supply.

The only persons who will be permitted to vote at this special election are duly registered, qualified, legal voters who are taxpayers within the city of Glendale. This is in accordance with provisions of the city charter and a new law passed at the last legislature limiting voters at municipal elections to taxpayers. The validity of this law is being questioned by some but the matter has never been passed on by the supreme court.

Some local dissatisfaction is being expressed regarding the ordinance providing for the bond issue and election because it ties two issues into one. The proposal to improve and repair water distribution system seems to meet with general approval. The proposal to increase the source of supply does not meet with the same unanimous approval since opinions vary as to this need and as to methods to be used to increase the water supply. The present city council will determine the proportion of money to be spent for repaving and for increasing source of supply if at Monday's election a majority of the voters vote to issue bonds.
