## DEAD WOMAN'S FORMER HUSBAND ADMITS BEATINGS

(Associated Press Local Wire)

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 10.—Continued grilling by detectives last night revealed in a confession by Charles B. McKenzie that during the past year he had frequently forced and beaten his estranged wife, Mrs. Anna Nelson McKenzie whose body was exhumed Friday for examination three days after her burial.

But the prisoner emphatically denied that he had beaten her ten days ago, when she was found dead in her apartment. He also admitted that he knew she was dead when he left the apartment and told the landlady that a doctor should be summoned.

Mrs. McKenzie was believed to have died of alcoholic poisoning but the body was taken from the corner. He said later that an autopsy revealed that she died of a hemorrhage and that she had been beaten about the head.

McKenzie and his friend, Joe Benson, saved themselves up to no time Saturday when an inquiry began and admitted being at the woman's apartment from early morning until noon of the day she died. Benson today admitted they came to the apartment at 10:30 a. m. on Saturday.

McKenzie admitted he had previously stated "because McKenzie wanted to get some money."

McKenzie admitted he lived off his wife's earnings. They claimed they had found the woman apparently unconscious from drinking and had placed her on aavenport and returned to another room. McKenzie admitted taking \$100 to find on her dresser.

Olto Nelson, a brother of the woman, told police today she had \$144 shortly before her death. Her purse, found behind the body, was empty.
