The managing director said, however, no whaler would be sent to the pack ice until a report is received from the expedition's own vessel, the City of New York, which is trying to reach Little America, the Byrd base on an indentation of the Ross sea, Antarctica.

CARDINAL PACELLI NEW SECRETARY OF VATICAN STATE

(Associated Press Leased Wire) VATICAN CITY, Feb. 10.—Cardinal Pacelli today formally took over the office of secretary of state for the vatican state. He was received by Pope Pius XI. early this morning and immediately thereafter commenced his functions, relieving Cardinal Gasparri.

Cardinal Gasparri's retirement came on the eve of the first anniversary of the signing of the lateran accord. Just as the signing of the lateran accord marked a tremendous step forward in the relations of the holy see and the quinquennial, so the past year has seemed to clear up many of the misunderstandings between the two governments, a situation largely credited to the outgoing cardinal.

Cardinal Pacelli until recently has been papal nuncio at Berlin. While there he made a notable record for himself as a diplomat. He returned to Rome recently to be made a cardinal and remained to learn something of the office which Cardinal Gasparri wished to be relieved of because of increasing age and poor health.

Cardinal Gasparri was made secretary of state for the vatican in 1914, after his creation as cardinal in 1907. He is 67 years old, whereas the incoming secretary, Cardinal Pacelli, is only a little more than 50.

Cardinal Gasparri remained some time ago and again insisted upon leaving his post at the end of 1928 but the pontiff begged him to remain longer, wishing him to complete the work he already had begun bringing about a conciliation of the church and state in Italy.

MASSACHUSETTS TO TEST ANGLE OF PROHIBITION LAW

(Associated Press Leased Wire) BOSTON, Feb. 10.—The federal grand jury has returned the first indictment in Massachusetts for purchase of liquor for beverage purposes. Elihu D. Stone, assistant U. S. attorney, said that it would be made a test case.

The grand jury returned two indictments against James Farrar of Watertown, one charging purchase of two pints of liquor and the other transportation of the liquor. Frank Rotondo, Cambridge store keeper, was indicted for sale of the liquor.

Stone said the indictments against Farrar were brought under section six, title 2, of the federal prohibition laws, stating "no one shall manufacture or sell, purchase or transport liquor." Indictments had not hitherto been brought against purchasers of liquor, he said, because of the difficulty in obtaining evidence.

Two federal enforcement agents claimed to have witnessed the purchase of liquor by Farrar.

NEW PORTLAND PASTOR BIDS WICHITA FAREWELL

WICHITA, Kan., Feb. 10.—The Rev. W. H. Rogers and family left here today for Portland, Oregon, where he is to be pastor of Mission Memorial Baptist church.

The minister preached his farewell sermons to three large congregations yesterday at the First Baptist church, speaking over a radio took-up last night.
