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"MOTHER" OFFERS NEW CERTIFICATE TO RETAIN BABY

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 12.—A revised birth certificate, offered by Mrs. George Schaefer, in lieu of one she alleged had been signed by Dr. Daniel Meyers, was accepted today by the city health officer after Mrs. Schaefer's attorney told Dr. Carl Ables, city health official, that Mrs. Schaefer's name had been forged to the original certificate.

The new certificate omitted two statements made in the former birth certificate, one of which stated that Mrs. Schaefer's baby had been born in the Portland maternal hospital and the other that she had been attended by Dr. Meyers.

The case attracted attention first when Schaefer sought to locate his wife after having been informed through a telephone message that she had given birth to a daughter in a hospital. For nearly a week Schaefer searched, finally Mrs. Schaefer was located at her home with the infant. A nurse in residence said the baby was six weeks old rather than one week.

The city health office refused to accept the birth certificate after the hospital and Dr. Meyers denied any connection with the case.

No explanation was offered by Mrs. Schaefer or her attorney at the conference.

VETERAN ENGINEER RECALLS FUNERAL TRAIN OF LINCOLN

REDLANDS, Cal., Feb. 12.—Sworded in black bunting and draped with American flags, a sable train rolled slowly over the New York Central tracks from New York to Utica between lines of silent, grieving people.

One of the cars carried the body of a slain president, Abraham Lincoln.

In the engine cab of the funeral train, slowly tolling the bell as the pallbearers passed, sat George W. Wrightson, who now believes he is last of six engineers, picked for ability who piloted the train from Washington to Springfield.

At each switch Wrightson peered cautiously from his cab. Each switch had been spiked, to prevent tampering until the train had passed. The cortege was given right-of-way over all other traffic.

"When we reached the depot at Syracuse, the train was greeted by the most impressive demonstration I have ever seen," Wrightson recalls.

The train shed was covered with the national colors and back feasted. An immense, silent throng had waited hours to glimpse the cortege.

There were five cars in the train, carrying members of the Lincoln family, government officials, the casket and newspapermen. They were the first Pullmans to run on a New York Central track.

The front of the engine bore a portrait of the martyred president. At sight of the picture and the draped locomotive, throngs along the track drew back. Some waved small flags. Others wept openly.

When the train had passed, they stepped to the track and watched it fade into the distance.

Wrightson, 88, is nearly blind and retired from railroading after 53 years service.

CANARIES SURVIVE BLAZE ON STEAMER

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—Far down in number 4 hold, flames to the right and left of them, a majority of 7,000 canaries lived through the fire that swept the North German Lloyd liner Muenchen.

When firemen penetrated the hold today, expecting to find all the birds dead, they were greeted with cheerful chirps. Water had seeped into the compartment but there was no indication that the flames or smoke had reached the feathered passengers.

The crates containing the birds were quickly removed to the deck and bird seed and water supplied.

3 BROTHERS GUESTS AT EDWARDS HOME

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 11.—Arthur Knight, World war veteran of Klamath Falls, Ore., filed suit in federal district court here today seeking a total disability rating and full benefits of his \$16,000 war risk insurance.

Knight claimed that he was crippled by an army mine at Fort Riley, Kansas, in January, 1928, and suffered injuries to his back from which he

is unable to perform his duties.

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TIGER LILIES

The variety for discussion this week is our own native Tiger Lily, called Lilium columbianum from the Columbia river.

It is found throughout Oregon and Washington west of the Cascade mountains. It grows among the bracken ferns and in open spaces, in rich loamy soils and poor heavy and gravelly soils. It is orange-yellow with small purple spots and grows to a height of four feet. It is a fine bloomer with small round buds in a raceme.

It should be planted six inches deep on its side and should have a moderately dry, cool situation with sun or light shade for the blossom. It blooms in June and may be obtained after the fall rains. It resents being moved while the ground is dry and warm. It should be well in a cool situation in the rock garden.
