The court has received many complaints regarding damage caused to roads by mills, and has been asked to enforce a rigid weight limitation rule. It has taken the position, however, that in view of the limited amount of employment it would work a great hardship on many families if the smaller mills were forced to curtail their cutting and so are endeavoring to keep the roads to saw-

mills in the best possible condition under the circumstances.
