Woman's Council of Christian Church Meets on Thursday Afternoon

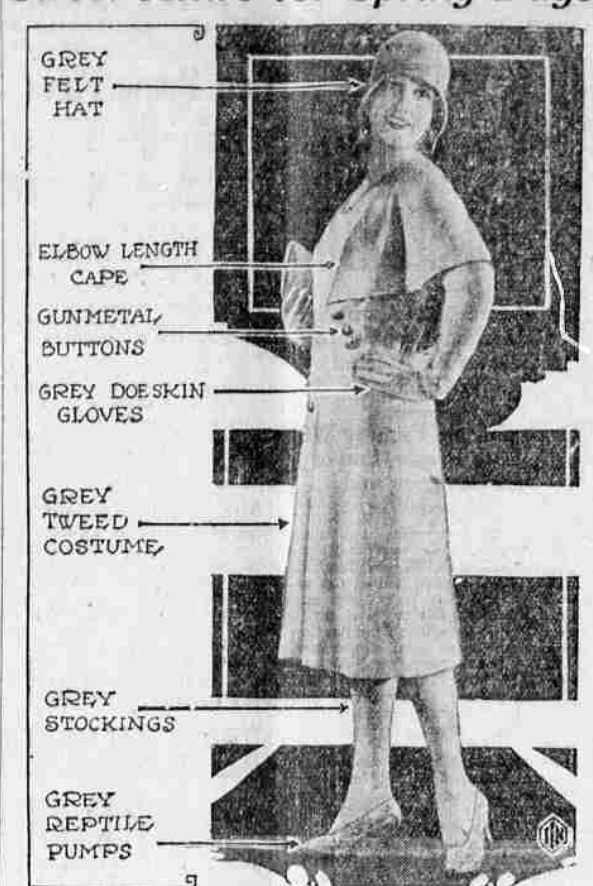
