GARDENS--and Other Things

The name of Ira N. Gabrielson, who is to lecture here next Monday night, is one with which readers of the popular garden magazines are familiar. He is to be the guest of the Roseburg Garden club and the lecture with stereoscopic and colored slides will be given at the South Methodist church at eight o'clock, February 17. The subject will be "Rock Plants and Rock Gardens."

Mr. Gabrielson is a very interesting man. He has two specialties—a vocation and an avocation. He is head of the U. S. biological survey for this district and it is under him that the rodent control work is done. He knows more about moles, gophers, squirrels, rats, crows and other pests—animal pests—than any man in Oregon. His avocation is the collection and study and propagation of our native rock plants. With his partner he has developed this business to such an extent that he is now a large exporter of rock plants to Europe. I am told that he sold in one single order ten thousand dollars worth of rock plants. Mr. Gabrielson's lectures have been very popular and every one who is in the least interested in this sort of thing will want to hear him. The public is invited and, as usual with the Garden club lectures, it is free.

If the perennial border is too wet to work these days the lily pool is not. Pools usually need cleaning out in the spring and it should be done soon because some of the hardy lilies are beginning to grow. Decaying lily leaves, water hyacinths and other plants that may have been caught by the frost make the water murky and had for the fish and should be moved. The fish grass spreads enormous and when the pool is drained a lot of it can be taken out. It gives one a chance to see just the condition of all the plants and to separate any that are overgrowing their boxes.

Draining the pool makes it possible to fertilize the lilies, and they need a lot of it. Bone meal, five cents a pound, is generally used and at the rate of one pound to a two-foot box. It can be poked into the soft mud around the plants and then covered with a little sand. Water lilies are very rank growers and become "pot-bound." At least every third year they have to be taken up, divided and replanted in fresh soil. Sometimes this has to be done the second year.

Those who fill the whole bottom of the pool with dirt do not have this trouble but they usually have another that is worse. Their lilies grow and spread so fast that the surface of the water is entirely covered and the beauty of the pool is spoiled.

Sometimes the lilies grow smaller and stop blooming before the end of the season for lack of nourishment. They can be fertilized at this time without draining the pool by taking the bone meal and mixing it with a little floor paste and making it up into small balls. These are allowed to dry hard, when they can be pushed down into the mud around the roots of the plants.

When the water is nearly out the fish will have to be caught and put in a tub of water. A salt water bath seems to be good for most of the ills that fish are all to and it is a tonic for them all. A strong solution is one teaspoonful to a quart and fish cannot be left in this more than a minute or two.

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But a spoonful to a gallon would be all right for the fish while the pool is being cleaned.

You may find some pets in the pool that you are not looking for, for instance those loathsome, lizard-like water-dogs. What botanical name, if any, the water-dog has I do not know. We call it "Schweinbrunn."
