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BOY KNOCKED DOWN AND SERIOUSLY HURT BY AN AUTOMOBILE

The party had stopped beside the highway near Wolf Creek to make some minor repairs to the car. The driver of the car which struck young Evans said he had no time to apply the brakes for the boy ran almost into his car and was struck a glancing blow which buried him to one side. Besides a possible compound fracture of the right leg, the boy was badly bruised and suffered cuts about the head.
