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Roaring Road Phonoplay



Harry Hartz, famous ace of the speedways, gives pretty Mary Brian, film queen, pointers about racing in this "still" from the latest "roaring road" phonoplay, "Burning Up," which has just been released by Paramount. Hartz and Cliff Bergere acted as technical advisers for the play which stars Richard Arlen as the heroic race pilot. Bergere's racer, powered with Richfield and lubricated with Richlube, just as in real speedway work, was used in the reel production. Hartz and Miss Brian are shown before one of the "Richfield Beacon" stations where the car was fueled while on location.

Screen stories based on the thrills and spills of the speedways have been interesting in the past, but lacking one important and dramatic element of racing—the roar of the cars and crowds.

Now that the phonoplay is here, however, all the sounds which add to the excitement of death-defying auto racing can be produced so that audiences hear as well as see the spectacular and pulse-stirring events of the "roaring road."

This is the case with "Burning Up," first of the sound racing stories, which has just been produced by Paramount and will shortly be shown in Roseburg.

In this story, in order to obtain exact racing conditions for a matched contest between Richard Arlen, the hero, and Francis McDonald, his competitor in the drama, two experts of the racing world were employed as technical advisers. They were Cliff Bergere, whose own car was used, and Harry Hartz, both veterans and aces of the speedways.

JURY DISAGREES IN HEART BALM ACTION AGAINST ACTRESS

NEW YORK, Feb. 19.—Despite the fact that no defense had been offered, a jury today reported disagreement in a \$100,000 alienation suit by Mrs. Mabel Mantion, actress, against Marjorie Rambeau, actress.

Supreme Court Justice Peter Schuch ordered the case to trial yesterday, although Miss Mantion's attorney said his client was in Los Angeles without sufficient funds to come to New York and unable to leave because of the critical illness of her mother.

Testimony chiefly concerned a hotel room by Mrs. Mantion on a Portland road, where the complainant said she found her husband, William Kevitt Mantion, in Miss Rambeau's company.

The jury deliberated only half an hour and then wrote out a sealed report of disagreement. Justice Schuch today ordered the case back for retrial.
