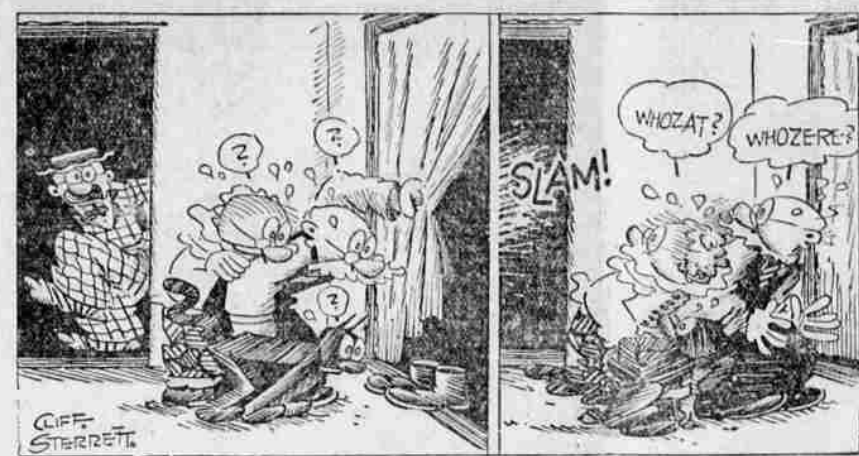
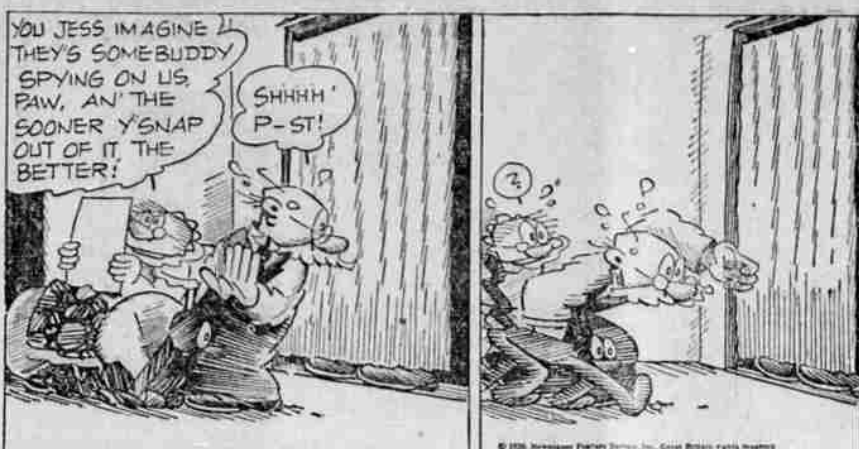
"THE WAILING AND GNASHING OF TEETH"

(Associated Press Local Wire) SEATTLE, Feb. 18.—Although she had lived alone in squalor in a small cottage here for many years, Mrs. Frances Jackson, 83-year-old widow of one of Seattle's early steamboat captains, today was revealed as the possessor of a fortune. The widow, whose son William T. Morley, 61, had her committed to a sanitarium last Saturday, had hoarded \$90,000 in cash, bonds and stocks, in a cache in the baseboard behind her kitchen stove. The woman, neighbors said, was obsessed with the idea she needed to save every penny for future necessity.

LET THE PEOPLE SAY

Alanson B. Houghton probably is right when he says that a declaration of war submitted to a plebiscite would not carry; he surely is right when he says, "War always has been declared for self-governing people by their governments, in almost every case the government being

a small group of men elected by the people not on war issues, but on purely domestic issues."

This country had ample illustration of both these points in 1916-1917. In 1916 a normal republican majority was overturned to re-elect President Wilson for no other reason than that, as the democratic campaign cry expressed it, "He kept us out of war." In the following April, President Wilson asked congress to declare war, and a congress elected largely on local issues followed his bidding.

The European engineers of the war knew better than to allow the people to have their say. The idea was driven home to all of them that their lives and property, and even their national existence was menaced; the only question that remained was, who could strike the first blow in self-defense. To permit a popular vote would have been to provide a cooling-time, would have given opponents a fighting chance to be heard, would have given reason an opportunity.

The logical next step after the ratification of the Kellogg pact by almost the entire world would be to submit another general treaty, under which all the signatories would agree that only their people could declare war. Then the question of war could be placed fairly and squarely on a nation that voted such a declaration. It is self-evident that no people, facing such an issue at the polls, would vote to ostracize and ruin itself. —The Detroit News.
