JUDGE FROWNS ON INDIAN'S WHOOP IN COURT ROOM

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 19.—Elmo Lobart's war whoop went along nicely in federal district court here today until Judge Bean frowned over his glasses, as judges have a peculiarity of doing, and then Elmo calmed down to hear the state charge his friend, Linden Cowen, Klamath reservation Indian, with beating Mrs. Cowen over the head with a hammer.

Without any provocation or visible ambition, Elmo danced around the judge's dais in real Indian fashion. Intermittently he emitted piercing screams which would have made a Comanche blush with shame.

Mrs. Cowen, marcelled and modestly attired, together with her daughter appeared in the court room and heard the state charge her husband with beating her over the head after an alleged family squabble.

Bernice Lobart, Cowen's stepdaughter and a relative of Elmo, is said to have participated in the family argument and she accompanied her mother to testify against Cowen.

The trial proceeded peacefully the remainder of the day.

LIQUOR SMUGGLER LOSES AIRPLANE ON CONVICTION

ZANESVILLE, Ohio, Feb. 20.—Clinton R. Hellingstein, 22, of Detroit, was fined \$300 and costs and his airplane valued at \$8,000 was ordered confiscated in common pleas court today when he pleaded guilty to charges of transporting liquor.

Hellingstein told the court that he had delivered a load of liquor to A. A. Pfaff of Zanesville for whom a warrant was immediately issued. The pilot told Judge C. F. Riddle he picked up his load of liquor on the Detroit river after it had been delivered from Canada by another airplane. He said he had delivered liquor to Cleveland, Toledo and a number of other northern Ohio cities during recent months.
