The Associated Press on January 25, 1930, brought this bright story from the United States senate in Washington: "Charles Curtis, once a boy on an Indian reservation and now vice-president of the United States, today celebrated his seventieth birthday with his ancient political foes, the democrats, joining republicans in tributes, congratulations and best wishes."

"As the senate convened, Senator Copeland, democrat, New York, gained the floor and said that it was his opinion as a doctor that the vice-president would have many more years in which to serve his country. "Mr. Curtis, who served twenty years in the senate from Kansas, smiles at this and replied, 'Thank you.' "It was the beginning of a deluge of plaudits. Senator Ashurst, democrat, Arizona, rose to praise the vice-president. He was followed by Senator Moses, republican, New Hampshire. Then Senator Blease, democrat, South Carolina, asserted: "I sincerely hope you will be president of the United States of America." Senator Heflin, democrat, Alabama, described the career of the vice-president as "inspiring," and added that "the youth of this country will be inspired by reading the story of this remarkable man."

"Senator Watson of Indiana, the republican leader, said Mr. Curtis had been a 'tower of strength in every conflict which the party was involved and when the fundamentals of the government were at stake. "He is a veritable Gibraltar," he added. "Vice-President Curtis began smiling as Senator Copeland rose and he was still smiling as a full gave him an opportunity for replying. "I love each and every one of you," he answered with feeling. "I assure each and every one of you my best wishes for all these kind- nesses."

(Associated Press Lead Wire) EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 21.—A state-wide organization of boxing and wrestling commissions for the purpose of instilling greater confidence in the minds of the followers of the sports and to protect matchmakers and the public from un dependable participants in the game probably will be effected soon if a movement started in Salem is successful.

The Salem boxing and wrestling commission adopted a resolution inviting the chairman of all boxing and wrestling commissions of the state to meet at Salem at a date to be appointed at which time the organization would be to present last officers elected and general plans of operation discussed.
