

POULTRY GROWERS OF DOUGLAS WILL MEET HERE FEB. 25

A county-wide poultry meeting of considerable importance will be held in Roseburg Tuesday, February 25, at the Knights of Pythias hall, at which time a very fine program will be presented. County Agent J. C. Leedy reports that this meeting has been arranged with a view of giving as much assistance as possible to the new poultrymen of the county, as well as aiding those already engaged in the industry.

Particular importance is being given the matter of care of baby chicks, the principal problem of poultrymen at this time of year. Talks will be given on brooder problems, care of chicks, diseases, etc. There will also be a question box in which poultrymen are asked to place questions relating to any particular items in which they are interested. The program has been

arranged to provide time after each address for a discussion of the matter presented.

Several reels of motion pictures will be presented, which will be of extreme value and interest. Mr. Leedy states that this will be one of the most important poultry meetings of the year, and he is urging every interested person to be present.

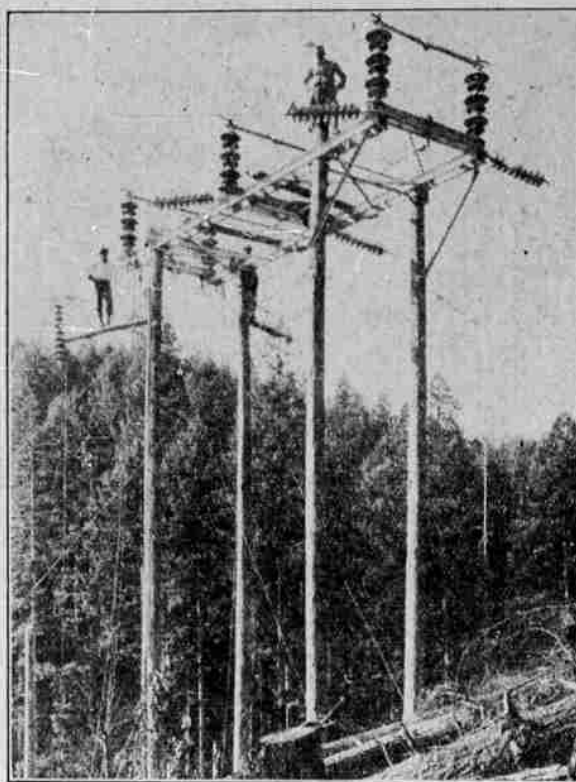

New Copco Line Completed to Link Up With Power System at Coos Bay



One of the huge towers on the new Dixonville-North Bend transmission line, completed in November of last year. This line, which is 55 miles long, connects the Coos system with the Coos Bay plant of the Mountain States Power company and is giving continuous and dependable service through a dual source of power.

Line 20, a new high tension line of 110,000 volts capacity, has recently been completed by the California Oregon Power company to connect the Coos system with that of the Mountain States Power company. This new line, which was the major construction project of the local power company last year, extends from Dixonville to North Bend, Oregon, a distance of approximately 65 miles. The interconnection of the systems of these two well known utilities is expected to improve service in their respective territories by providing an additional source of power supply for both companies.

A large new 16,000 kilowatt addition to the Mountain States Power company's Coos Bay steam electric generating station at North Bend, Oregon, is well under way and is scheduled for completion by July 1, 1930. This addition will triple the size of the present station, which was built in 1924, increasing the capacity from 5,000 to 15,000 kilowatts.

Line 20, which connects the local Coos transmission system with the Coos Bay steam plant, traverses a rough, mountainous country covered with heavy timber, which made construction work extremely difficult. It is interesting to note that in the survey of this new transmission line the latest modern methods were employed, an airplane being employed for the purpose of making an aerial reconnaissance which proved valuable in determining the best route to follow through this rugged country.

The carrying on of this extensive construction work represented by the above high tension line has involved the expenditure of a large sum of money in this territory for labor, foodstuffs and materials. In accordance with the usual Coos policy, local labor and materials were given the preference wherever possible to do so.

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SOIL OF DOUGLAS FOUND FAVORABLE FOR LILY GROWING

(Editor's Note—Following is the last of a series of seven reports printed in the News-Review, dealing with the outlook for fruit crops in Douglas county and containing recommendations for activities on part of the growers. These reports were submitted at the meeting of county fruit growers held at Sutherlin February 14.)

The general outlook for flowering bulbs is good, with the exception of gladioli which have been overproduced in Jackson and Joseph counties. The future will hold much competition and will bring close cooperation in marketing.

The rich loam river soils of Douglas county and the mild winters and cool summers make this an ideal bulb producing section.

Gladioli may be grown on a wide variety of soils but the general outlook is not favorable for an increase in production.

Narcissus have been increased in the county. The soil and climatic conditions and general outlook justify an extensive increase in acreage.

Small plantings of bulbous iris have been made with good results in quality of stock produced.

Tulips are not grown in sufficient quantity to be a factor, but soil conditions and market outlook would justify an acreage being planted.

Growing of lily bulbs commercially has increased in the county. Soil and climatic conditions are very favorable to lily culture in nearly all the varieties. A wide field in this crop is open as annually millions of bulbs are imported to supply the demands of the florists. These could be profitably grown in this county.

The American stock is preferred to the imported stock by the buyers. Market outlook in general justifies an increase in a number of forcing lilies and nearly all varieties used for garden work.

The estimated number of bulbs in the county from a commercial point is approximately 120,000.
