ROSEBURG SENIORS DEFEAT BANDON'S QUINTET 31 TO 15

Local Basketeers Fail to Flash in First Period But Hit Winning Stride in 2nd.

The Roseburg senior high school basketball team had local fans badly worried for a short time last night in the game with Bandon high school. The local team had a hard time getting started, and the first half had the fans, who were rooting for Roseburg, frantic. The team, however, hit its pace in the second half and won the contest 31 to 15.

The first quarter was a brilliant exhibition of air-tight checking on both sides. The Roseburg team was traveling too fast and was overshooting, passing wide, and missing breaks. Guards on both teams were playing sensational ball, and neither team could get an opening.

Linn, Bandon's "Deadeye Dick," who can shoot baskets from almost any position on the floor, secured Bandon's only basket for the quarter, while Roseburg failed to secure a single field goal in the first period. Hoffman, Roseburg's high point man, made one free throw, the quarter ending 2 to 1 in Bandon's favor.

In the second quarter Roseburg settled down somewhat, but the game was nip and tuck, the score at the half being 9 to 7 in Roseburg's favor.

Smother Work Wins When the boys came back after their rest period, however, the local boys had settled down into their normal pace and began rapidly forging ahead. Bandon took time out on several occasions to talk over their defense, and tried several different shifts to meet the fast offensive that Roseburg had opened up. The Roseburg team, however, was not to be stopped and the score at the end of the third period was 25 to 12.

The last period saw Roseburg continuing to gain, despite a desperate Bandon rally, and the final score was 31 to 15.
