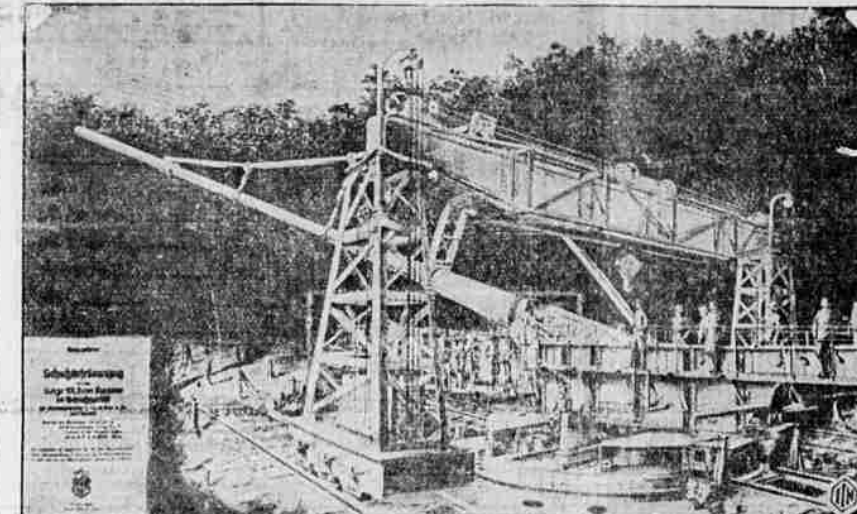

GERMAN MYSTERY GUN OF 1918



Above is the first drawing published in America showing one of the German mystery guns which shelled Paris in 1918 from a distance of seventy-five miles. The drawing was prepared by Colonel H. W. Miller, who was chief engineer in charge of heavy artillery in the U. S. army during the war, and is used as one of the illustrations of his new book, "The Big Bertha." Its turret is mounted on wheels embracing several railroad tracks.

Dr. Clarence Spears, football coach at University of Minnesota, today signed a contract to coach football at the University of Oregon next season. The action followed a lengthy conference here with Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, president of the Oregon university.

Dr. Spears signed a five-year contract and will take charge of the Oregon squad next fall. He also will conduct classes in coaching and assume duties in connection with the University of Oregon health service.

Dr. Spears will receive \$11,500 a year, \$2000 more than his predecessor, Captain John J. McEwan. However, Dr. Spears will assume additional duties in the class room and health work.

Dr. Spears came to Minnesota five years ago from West Virginia university, succeeding Bill Spaulding, now coach at the University of California, southern branch. During his stay as coach at Minnesota the Gophers have won twenty-eight games, lost nine and tied three.—Associated Press story from Missoula, Montana, January 15, 1930.

HOOVER ENDORSES PLAN FOR TRAINING IN PUBLIC AFFAIRS

PRINCETON, N. J., Feb. 23.—Establishment of a school of public and international affairs at Princeton university was announced yesterday by President John Grier Hibben at a meeting of the national alumni association.

The school, which will give instruction to students in both undergraduate and graduate years, will provide a coordinated training in liberal studies in the fields of history, politics, economics, and political geography, and modern languages and literature. Also, it will add to the faculty in these departments visiting lecturers to be filled by men of experience in world affairs who will present to the students actual conditions existing in the world as seen from the practical side.

In addition the school, it was announced, will arrange for exchange professorships with foreign universities and students of the school will engage in supervised study in foreign countries during their summer vacations.

Dr. Hibben said that the school "will aim to develop for the country each year a body of young men who will have not only a preliminary foundation for public and international careers, but also a new sense of direction and responsibility for the affairs of their state and country."

A letter from President Hoover, congratulating the university on "this further evidence of its ambition to share in the training of men for intelligent citizenship and interest and participation in public affairs," was read at the meeting by Dr. Hibben.

"The need for good men in government," President Hoover wrote, "does not grow less and in the hands of inspiring teachers the work of this school should leave a lasting impression upon the lives of promising young men at the time when they are engaged in shaping their future careers. Even though many may not actually enter public life, it would be strange if they did not benefit from a thorough understanding of the problems of government and of our relation to other peoples."

WATZIG HATCHERY IMPROVES STOCK AND EQUIPMENT

In addition to having moved its office and equipment to the Green building at the north end of Jackson street, the Watzig commercial chick hatchery announces the installation of new electric equipment and additional facilities for handling its rapidly growing business.

The Watzig hatchery has received, according to Mr. Watzig, the largest shipment of pedigreed chicks, from Ambrose Brownell of Milwaukee, ever to be brought in to this valley. Accompanying the shipment of 500 chicks was an affidavit signed and sworn to by Brownell, certifying that the 500 chicks were from trapped Leechhorns with performance records of 250 to 300 eggs laid in 365 days.

The new chicks will be added to the blooded strain now owned by the Watzigs for the purpose of producing the finest hatching eggs.
