

WOOL OUTPUT OF STATE INCREASES. SURVEY REVEALS

Oregon's Need Can Be Met
and Leave Surplus of
14,000 Pounds for
Outside Sale.

Pacific Cooperative Joins
National Association;
More Beef Killed
Than Raised.

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 25.—Important developments in the Oregon livestock industry during the past few years have been a notable increase in wool, a gradual decline in the use of horses, according to a survey made by different investigators for the University of Oregon. A. L. Lomax and T. N. Van Gilder.

The wool industry of Oregon has expanded to such an extent that at present it produces enough fiber to supply Oregon and still have an exportable surplus of more than 14,000,000 pounds annually. Production of mohair is approximately 462,000 pounds all available for export and shipped mainly to the Atlantic seaboard where it is used for upholstery and draperies.

Texan mules are listed generally at a price two cents higher than the Oregon product, the survey pointed out, a condition due to the fact that the Texas growers are building up their flocks and fleeces by selective breeding and the use of thoroughbred horses, whereas there is only a slight indication of similar activity on the part of Oregon farmers.

More Beef Killed
Figures on the cattle industry tend to indicate that Oregon is killing more beef than it is raising, since a decrease of 27.2 per cent in the last 11 years is shown by the loss of 252,000 head since 1919 where there were 925,000 head on Oregon farms. There is, however, a considerable exportable surplus of beef as well as veal, mutton and pork. Oregon's exportable surplus of cattle is in direct competition with the corn-fed cattle of the midwest, especially when the demand is slack. At other times when prices are firm and rising, the range fed animals of this state find no difficulty in meeting buyers, the report stated.

Horses on farms in Oregon since 1919 have shown a decrease mainly because of the more extensive use of tractors and other mechanical farm machinery previously operated by teams, the report said.

Wool Co-op Merges
Of interest to Douglas county sheep men was the definite acceptance of the national wool marketing program by the board of directors of the Pacific Cooperative Wool Growers, meeting last week in Portland, and stock in the National Wool Marketing corporation was voted. Directors representing the Willamette valley and western and southern Oregon include E. A. McCormack of Eugene, president of the association, G. A. Sandner of Seaside, Geo. Hall of Oakland and Loren Miller of Dillard.

This action of the board places the Pacific Cooperative Wool Growers, which is the largest regional wool marketing association in the United States, in a position to immediately secure for its members all of the benefits of the national program including preshipment advances of \$1.00 per head, wool advances up to 50 per cent of the value of the clip upon delivery, and the service of the national sales agency.

The Pacific Cooperative Wool Growers has 2500 members in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, California and Nevada.

More than a million pounds of wool, from 10,000 sheep, have been shorn on new marketing agreements since the first of January, by the Pacific Wool Growers. The association formerly handled around 5,000,000 pounds annually but this will be increased to at least eight or nine million

Oregon State remained in the lead in team scoring with an aggregate of 467 with Oregon in second place with 461 and Washington third with 452.

TODAY'S MARKETS

PORTLAND, Feb. 25.—Butter prices went up, while egg and flour quotations declined today. Extras and standards in butter each made a leap of 10 and the lower grades advanced 10 and 20. Buttermilk was 10c.

All grades of eggs hit the tobacconist for recessions of 20 each, making the price of fresh extras to retailers 20c.

Flour prices were off 20c in keeping with the declining wheat market.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:

"General supplies of southern vegetables and active movement to retailers, which resulted from generally lower prices, characterized the wholesale fruit and vegetable market."

"Price declines were registered in

celery, carrots, cauliflower, lettuce and spinach. Onions are dull, and Oregon stock of fair quality sold to retailers as low as \$1.25 per cwt. Local cabbage stocks are generally rather poor, and supplies are limited. Limited volume of southern produce is reaching in sales to retailers as high as \$5.50 per cwt. for Imperial valley cannonball type.

The Imperial valley again established an all-time record volume of lettuce loadings last Friday, with 257 cars forwarded from the district. Voluntary curtailment over the week-end, with practically no loadings, was successfully effected, to stabilize the lettuce market.

Willamette valley points continue to ship considerable volume of ungraded apples of rather poor quality and condition to Portland, but local dealers state that this week should witness the termination of this movement to a large extent.
