HOUSE OF RAHAB

THEME OF SERMON

Rev. V. K. Allison, who is conducting evangelistic meetings at the First Christian church, spoke last night on the subject "The Scarlet Cord in the Window," using as a topic theme the sparring of the house of Rahab in the city of Jericho. The speaker likened the cord to salvation, showing the need of the Bible in the schools, the home and daily lives. The subject tonight is "Hiding in the Baggage."

The witness also testified that after the conventions Worthington had outlined a program to Huston for Hoover to carry Tennessee.

Gray added he was worried about what the two candidates might say about Muscle Shoals in their campaign speeches but was "particularly" worried about the democratic candidate, Alfred E. Smith.

Gray said he could throw no light upon the influence the proposals shaped by Huston might have had on party platforms.

POULTRYMEN AT
LOCAL MEETING
HEAR O. S. C. MEN

Poultrymen of the county evidenced a great interest in the meeting held today at the Knights of Pythias hall. There were nearly 150 men and women present for the meeting this morning, while the afternoon attendance was considerably larger.

The session was a little slow in starting, so that the question and discussion period was moved to the afternoon session. The program opened with a brief address by H. E. Cooby, poultry specialist from the State college extension service, who spoke on brooding and brooding problems, giving a great deal of interesting and helpful information. This was followed by several reels of motion pictures dealing with the care of baby chicks. The pictures being very cleverly arranged to give a sort of humorous plot in connection with the educational feature.

Dr. W. T. Johnson, poultry pathologist of the Oregon experiment station, discussed artificial brooder yards, in an interesting address before the noon hour.

Immediately following the luncheon recess, there was a short talk by J. C. Leedy, county agent, who spoke on the poultry situation in Douglas county, after which the questions and discussions were enjoyed. Additional talks and another set of motion picture films took up the remainder of the afternoon.

DAIRYMEN URGED
TO DO MORE FOR
OWN INTERESTS

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Feb. 25.—Urging application of "scientific facts and proven truths" in the conduct of dairying in Oregon, D. O. Woodworth, Albany, Ore., member of the state fair board and former president of the Oregon Dairy Cattle club, sounded a keynote of the annual meeting of the Oregon Dairymen's association here today.

E. P. Lewis, president of the Marshfield chamber of commerce, welcomed the delegates.

"Prices are down, consumption is decreased, warehouse stocks are abnormally large and use of substitutes is increasing," Woodworth said in discussing the dairy business. "This does not imply that dairymen should sit idly by and expect to be lifted out of the mire of financial distress by a magic wand or sugar-coated nostrums offered by political and oratorical practitioners and self-appointed experts."

Woodworth said Oregon produced and developed more than 60 per cent of the world record cows.

HUSTON LINKED
WITH SHOALS PLANK
OF MAJOR PARTIES

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—Testimony that Claudius H. Huston, chairman of the republican national committee, had assisted in preparing proposed Muscle Shoals planks for the democratic and republican national platforms in 1928 was heard today by the senate lobby committee.

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FORMER RULER OF
PORTUGAL WORLD'S
RICHEST ROYALIST

LISBON, Feb. 26.—Former King Manuel of Portugal is the richest member of royalty in the world. The forty year old sovereign, who since his dethronement in 1910, has been holding a sort of royal court in London, is said by his friends to be worth upward of \$50,000,000 in real estate alone.

In addition to a large bondholder in various Portuguese, British and French companies and also possesses valuable collections of jewels, oil-paintings, rare tapestries, miniatures and priceless old coins.

Unlike other exiled kings, Manuel has been allowed to retain all his estates and other property in Portugal. The annual income from these is said to exceed \$1,000,000. The former sovereign's mother, ex-Queen Amelia, who is living in France, also has immense holdings in real estate in Portugal, which yield her a large income.

Although Manuel has never formally abdicated, it is declared by supporters of the present republic that the handsome exile has little chance of ever regaining the throne which up to the time he was dethroned, had been occupied by the Braganza dynasty for more than three hundred and fifty years.

These adherents of the republic argue that Portugal has made more progress in the twenty years under republican governments than for any similar period in monarchistic times, and that therefore the Portuguese people as a whole do not favor a return of the king.

Nevertheless, the dictatorial government of General Carmona has suppressed all active monarchistic elements within Portugal, the only important royalists now residing in France or England, where it is said they can do little to overthrow the existing militaristic regime in Lisbon.

Throughout his long exile, Manuel, who succeeded to the throne after the assassination of his father and brother in 1908, has conducted himself in a way to win the approval of even some avowed enemies of the monarchy. He has not sought restoration of the dynasty, nor has he associated himself with any other enemies of the republic.

It was because of his exemplary attitude in that respect that the republic has allowed him to retain his properties in Portugal.
