

HOOVER EVASIVE ON DRY STATUTE. SENATOR CHARGES

Enforcement Stand Dodged
and No Progress Made
by Administration,
McKellar Says.

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—The statement that the dry laws would never be enforced until President Hoover "takes a stand in the matter" was made in the senate by Senator McKellar, democrat, Tennessee.

McKellar's assertion was made during an attack on an article in yesterday's Washington Star which reviewed the first year's work of the Hoover administration.

The Tennesseean said there was no doubt that the article was "inspired by the regular republican organization."

Regarding that portion of the article dealing with law enforcement, McKellar said if Mr. Hoover had "made one single advance in law enforcement," he challenged anyone to show what it was.

"The law was never so flagrantly violated and the reason is because the president won't take a stand for enforcement," he asserted.

Speaking of the law enforcement

commission, McKellar said that "if ever there was a fizzle, it was that commission."

"Mr. Hoover," he went on, "can't even get the house, which he is supposed to control, to ratify all that the commission has done. Its recommendations were virtually innocuous and meant nothing in the world. The best that can be said of it is that it is a notable example of Mr. Hoover's commission form of government."

McKellar said "every important step in my judgment that the administration has taken since it came into power has been to injure the country and there are absolutely no accomplishments to the credit of Mr. Hoover."

"Whatever the causes," asserted McKellar, "during the first year of Mr. Hoover's administration we have had the greatest panic we have had in many years."

"We have had the greatest industrial depression."

"We have had innumerable bank failures."

"We have had great numbers of unemployed."

"The farmers are still in the worst plight of their history."

"More than that, another accomplishment of Mr. Hoover is that he has split his own party into smithereens, and nobody as yet has been able to find out which side the president is on. Some of the reactionaries say that he is on their side and some of the progressives say that he is on their side. The most of the reactionaries believe that he is with the reactionaries. Mr. Grundy says that he is opposed to industry and Mr. Borah seems to think that he is opposed to the farmers and there you are."

PROHIBITION POLL BEING TAKEN BY LITERARY DIGEST

NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—20,000,000 voters throughout the entire United States are now being polled for their opinions on prohibition by The Literary Digest, which has accurately predicted the outcome of the last three presidential campaigns through "straw" votes, according to Dr. William Weaver Woods, editor-in-chief of the magazine.

Roseburg's allotment of ballots has already been mailed from the post's headquarters in New York City and should be distributed by the local post office here within a few days, according to advice received today.

The first tabulated returns of the nation-wide balloting will be published about the middle of March, it is stated.

Distribution of the postcard ballots which are used in this "straw" referendum have been mailed widely throughout the United States already.

Each ballot is said to be strictly secret and requires no signature and entails no obligation on the part of the voter. The ballot has three questions, of which the voter is asked to choose the one policy he favors:

1. Do you favor the continuance of the strict enforcement of the eighteenth amendment and Volstead law?

2. Do you favor a modification of the Volstead law to permit light wines and beers?

3. Do you favor a repeal of the prohibition amendment?

The 20,000,000 names to which the "straw" votes are being sent is the most accurate mailing list available," says Doctor Woods. "It includes every state, city and county, class and occupation, in the country. The list of names has been compiled from the same source that proved so successful in previous Literary Digest polls."

"To guard against tampering, fraud and counterfeiting, a patented cardboard, which cannot be imitated, is used for printing the ballots. All spurious votes can be detected immediately and destroyed."

"In keeping with its time-honored policy, The Literary Digest guarantees that this referendum

3 PLANE CRASHES
IN ONE DAY EACH
TAKE TWO LIVES

GREAT FALLS, Mont., Feb. 25.—Henry B. Lorentz, 33, and E. C. Smith, both of Great Falls, were killed when their plane crashed in a field eleven miles west of Stanford, Mont., yesterday.

The wrecked plane and the bodies were discovered by George McKenna, a farmer, who was searching for the cow that did not return with the herd last night.

He found the cow paralyzed 200 yards from the plane, indicating the plane had struck the animal and had been wrecked trying to make a landing.

SANTA MARIA, Cal., Feb. 25.—Thomas J. Middleton, 24, of Los Angeles, student at an airplane school here, and Joseph W. Pearson, an instructor, were killed in the crash of their ship 13 miles east of here yesterday. The ship was flying over a ranch when it was seen to fall.

SMYRNA, Ga., Feb. 25.—George Tarbell Patten, 28, capitalist of Chattanooga, Tenn., was killed and his family physician, Dr. Lytle D. West, injured fatally here yesterday in the crash of an airplane which was taking them to the bedside of Mrs. Patten in Florida.

REVOLUTIONISTS IN SANTO DOMINGO MAKING HEADWAY

President in Fortress and Vice President Quits; Business Men Ask U. S. to Step In.

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic, Feb. 25.—The national assembly of the Dominican republic will meet Thursday to consider the resignation of the vice president, Dr. Jose D. Alfonsea. Meanwhile the American minister, Charles B. Curtis, is intervening to bring peace between the government and revolutionary factions.

Faced with a revolutionary movement in the north of the republic and disturbed by local trouble yesterday, the city of Santo Domingo was quiet today.

President Horacio Vasquez and Vice President Alfonsea passed the night in the Santo Domingo fortress, the commander of which had remained loyal to the government. Madame Vasquez, wife of the president, took refuge in the American legation.

President Vasquez, whose term of office expires in May, has not resigned.

Revolt Gaining
PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti, Feb. 25.—Reports that the revolutionary movement in the Dominican republic was extremely serious and that it had spread throughout most of the country, meeting with little opposition, were received in Port-Au-Prince today.

At least three deaths were reported at various places with half a dozen wounded. Motor vehicles were said to have been commandeered to transport insurgents to the capital.

In all cities except Puerto Plata, insurgents disarmed the local police and distributed arms to the revolutionaries. They met little opposition.

It was reported business men at Santiago had requested American intervention in order to end trouble between warring political factions.

RAILROADS WIN IN
HIGH COURT DECREE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—A decision of outstanding importance to railroads was given by the supreme court yesterday when it held that

roads in paying for shipments lost in transit could not be required to pay what the lost merchandise would have brought if it had been delivered and sold at retail.

The section of the packers and stock yards act of 1921 authorizing the secretary of agriculture to fix maximum rates to be charged for livestock commission salesmen, was sustained as valid by the supreme court.

RUSSIA KEEPS ON
CLOSING CHURCHES

MOSCOW, Feb. 25.—Despite the campaigns abroad against the soviet government for its attitude toward religion, soviet authorities in different parts of the union have closed a number of additional churches, synagogues and mosques.

These, it was declared, were shut "upon petition of the workers and peasants."

Another dispatch said that in Tver, Central Russia, the soviet officials decided to close a local synagogue and to convert it into a club "upon the insistent demand of laboring Jews."

MALADY CLAIMS
MOTHER AND SON

PEIPING, China, Feb. 25.—Mrs. Margaret Gorman Rupertus, of Albany, N. Y., wife of Major William Rupertus, second in command of the American marine legion guard, died late today, ten hours after the death of her 11-year-old son, William Jr. Both deaths were from scarlet fever.

The deaths marked the third in the Rupertus family since its coming to Peiping last fall. A daughter, Rodney, aged four, died of scarlet fever in December.
