FIRST CARLOAD OF UMPQUA BROCCOLI, 1930, SHIPPED OUT

The first carload of broccoli from the Umpqua valley was shipped out today. It was loaded by the Umpqua Broccoli Exchange, of which Foster Butler is manager, and was of excellent quality and size. It is expected that this will be the only carload shipment for several days, as the present cold weather is holding back the maturity of the crop very noticeably. The season is considerably ahead of last year, as the first carload last year was shipped March 16.

The cold weather, however, is expected to be very beneficial, as the California season has now passed its peak, and the market, which has been quite low, is readjusting itself and the demand is growing stronger, so that by holding back the crop the weather will enable growers to get better prices.

The Roseburg district pool of broccoli growers who have lined up with Garcia & Mazzoni Co. to market their broccoli this year, met at Clay Smith's last night. Clarence Mabley was elected to represent the growers in all matters pertaining to the selling, accounting and distribution of the funds. Due to the continued cold weather it seems unlikely that car load shipments will be made before the first of next week. In the meantime shipments have been made daily by truck to Portland and other local markets. Until the pool begins to load cars, which will be done through the Metzger mill warehouse local shipments will be received and handled by the Consolidated Truck Co., on Douglas street.

From advices received last night the markets in the northwest have improved and there is every indication that around March 1st there will be quite a demand for Douglas county broccoli, which, up to the present has been supplied with California cauliflower.

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OAKLAND OIL CO. VOTES INCREASE IN STOCK TO \$400,000

A special meeting of the stockholders of the Oakland Oil company was held yesterday evening at Oakland for the purpose of voting upon a proposed increase of capital stock. Several suggestions were made as to the amount of stock to be issued, but it was finally decided to increase to \$400,000, which is doubling the amount of stock now issued. Only a limited amount of the stock will be sold at this time, as the money will not be needed until production is reached. At that time, however, it will be necessary to spend a large sum immediately to secure equipment, but when the well is proven there will be no trouble selling the stock, the stockholders believe.

It is expected that drilling will be resumed within the next few weeks. It was necessary to shut down recently because of the lack of fuel and because the condition of the roads would not permit transportation of wood to the well.

As soon as the roads dry out sufficiently the drill will be started again, funds being available in the treasury to carry on the work.

The swift wings of radio brought this little speech across the At lantic about the time of the opening of the disarmament conference in January, 1929.

Vincent Coeli of Chelmsford, the British representative with the league of nations, addressing a gathering of international students at University college here, described the naval conference as 'a prelude to a greater agreement spreading over the earth.'

"You are assisting," he said, "at the first step in a movement in which you will have to bear your part. The most important fact to realize is that disarmament is essential to international friendship. It will not come in a day or a year. It will begin slowly, but once it has begun, we shall be able to advance."

"Lord Cecil warned them not to think peace was desirable merely to avoid war," he said, "but its dangers as well as war. We cannot deny that in wartime great virtues as well as vices develop. Do not think we are preparing an easy life for ourselves. There is just as great glory and romance about the work for peace as for war. Let us in the first place press on with disarmament, remembering always that peace is not an end in itself, but an opportunity for human achievement."

It is wise to hark when great men speak; For world-wide good such men will seek. Lord Cecil looks with prophet's eyes. And reads the portents of the skies. He calls old England's college youth To grasp anew this vital truth; That life will be no easy mark. Though cannons cease to growl and bark.

That good, indeed, to spike the guns That rob fond mothers of their sons. That good to raise the frowning forts. And everything that hatred courts. 'Tis good to banish warlike ships. That belch destruction from their lips. But life will still demand our best. And be a brave and daring quest.

That civilization may increase. In times of quiet, restful peace. Requires an every day advance; That in our toil we find romance; We rise above all selfish ease. And no unworthy passions please; We cherish every high ideal. And give ourselves to make them real.

We still shall need self sacrifice To build the stars by which men rise. Our wealth will be our greatest share Unless we shall with brothers share. But if we shall each other serve, We soon shall grow a zealous nerve. And o'er the whole of earth's green sod Shall spread the glory of our God.
