AMERICAN LEGION NOT IN POLITICS, STATE HEAD SAYS

Emphatic disclaimers that the American Legion is interested in political activities of candidates for governor or candidates for other offices, is made in a statement received today by James Soles, commander of Umpqua post from Sidney S. George, department commander. Due to rumors spread throughout the state of legion participation in political campaigns, Mr. George asks that the statement be given publicity. Radio stations of the state are also giving the statement prominence in broadcasts.

In his statement to the public Mr. George says:

"Inasmuch as there have been numerous rumors concerning the activities of the American Legion in the present primary contests, both by word of mouth and in the press of the state, whereby mention is made of 'American Legion' influence and 'American Legion' candidates, and the impression is created that the American Legion is sponsoring or opposing candidates, I take this opportunity, with the approval of the department executive committee to state the true position of the American Legion with regard to partisan politics, and to further state that so long as I am department commander this position will be rigidly adhered to.

"The American Legion is incorporated under a special act of congress and its national constitution contains a prohibition against its interfering in partisan politics. The Department of Oregon's constitution contains a similar prohibition. However, the American Legion does urge that its members, as well as all citizens, fulfill the duties of citizenship which include an intelligent participation in the function of government. We urge that all citizens, as well as our members register and vote. Our slogan is 'Vote as you please, but please VOTE.' Many posts have put on campaigns to increase registration of voters, with the full cooperation of the constituted authorities, and have enlisted the enthusiastic support of other community service organizations.

"Naturally, under such a program, many ex-service men, both affiliated with the American Legion and outside it, have taken an active participation in politics. I wish to make it as emphatic as I know how, that this is an individual action on their part—it is their right and privilege as a citizen, and while such action is to their credit as citizens, it does not in any way involve the American Legion.

"I would most respectfully request all citizens and especially the press, when referring to political activities of ex-service men, to use the term 'ex-service' instead of 'American Legion'.

"The American Legion will be content to follow its original motto, 'politics, not politics', secure in the belief that individuals having membership therein, and to be found in the support of all candidates will take care of the politics.

"Endorsement of candidates is thus absolutely prohibited, either by individual posts or by the department convention, neither is a partisan discussion permitted on the floor of a Legion meeting. While these provisions may be evaded in individual cases, it is unconstitutional and is frowned on by all Legion authorities, and renders possible the revocation of a charter."

UP GRADE TREND SEEN IN PACIFIC COAST BUSINESS

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 26.—Business is on the up grade in the Twelfth federal reserve district the San Francisco federal reserve bank reported today. Trade in building, lumber and other industries, while lower in January, improved late in that month and the impetus carried forward into February.

After allowing for usual seasonal changes in industrial production, retail sales and freight car loadings, sales by wholesalers were practically the same in January as for December, the report said, whereas there is ordinarily a small decline. The report indicated that during January there was a considerable increase in unemployment, some industries which had previously been on full time schedules for many months were operating on a part time basis.

Marketing of agricultural products, excepting wheat, has progressed satisfactorily, the bank said. Price decreases were noted, however, in a number of farm products, causing a general lowering of the commodity price level.

OREGON DAIRYMAN OPPOSE EXPANSION OF STATE INDUSTRY

COQUILLE, Ore., Feb. 26.—A firm stand against undue expansion of the dairy industry in Oregon was taken here today when the annual convention of the Oregon State Dairy association convened for the final session and adopted a report of the committee on expansion.

There is no reason for the good dairy farmer to be unduly alarmed, the report said. Economic production and quality products were suggested together with sound advertising policy.

The report called special attention to the need of a more economic production of feeds, better farm management, elimination of old cows not producing 300 pounds of fat and the use of better alien.

The committee report on disease control urged completion of tuberculosis work to make an accredited state and suggested the passage of a law providing for state deputies on full time to carry on the work. It also suggested that a statewide committee of dairymen meet with the state sanitary board to work out some changes in the method of abortion work.

MEXICO AIRMAIL BUSINESS HEAVY

Approximately seven tons of air mail and fifteen tons of express matter have been transported by planes of the Pielwick Latin American Airways tri-weekly line linking Los Angeles with Mexico City, Guatemala and El Salvador during the five months the system has been in operation. It was announced by Thomas E. Morgan, general manager.

"In the same period," Mr. Morgan said, "incomplete records show that some 2,000 passengers traveled the line. While the bulk of the passenger travel is point to point business, a considerable number of travelers have made the journey from Los Angeles to Mexico City, Guatemala City and San Salvador."

Air mail on the Mexico line averages in excess of 2,500 pounds a month, Morgan said, while the volume of express is more than double that figure.

The volume of express exported from Los Angeles and San Diego exceeds the incoming express by approximately three to one, figures show.
