M. on March 2, 1930, sealed bids for the purchase of sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000) of Water Bonds of 1929, of the City of Glendale, Oregon. Said bonds will be in denominations of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) each, dated March 1, 1930, and maturing as follows: Bond No. 1 will mature on March 1, 1931, and one bond of consecutive number will mature on the 1st of March of each and every year thereafter including March 1, 1949. THE LINDBERGH LEGEND

The Associated Press sends out this interesting Lindbergh story at the dawn of 1931.

"Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh threw away an aviation million as well as a movie million soon after his return from his epochal Paris flight, according to recollections made in 'Lindbergh Flies On,' a new book by Earl Reeves, published by Robert M. McBride & Co.

"In a chapter contributed by 'Casey' Jones the story is told.

"A group of men was to form a ten million dollar company to develop commercial aviation. The presidency, and a financial interest of Hollywood proportions, was offered the colonel.

"Lindbergh's reply was described as concise—and typical.

"I cannot do what you wish me to do," he said. "In the first place, I am not competent to undertake such a responsibility.

"Second, it would interfere with my freedom of movement. I'm down to a den.

"And third—and here his color heightened—I am not worth any such sum as you mention."
