

GRADUATION ON MENTAL CAPACITY, EDUCATOR'S IDEA

CHICAGO, Feb. 28.—An expansion program, revolutionary in some of its aspects, was presented by President Robert Maynard Hutchins of the University of Chicago to an alumni group Tuesday night.

Elimination of freshmen and sophomores as such, and the establishment of a separate collegiate division for them are included in the plan. The purpose of the new system, Dr. Hutchins said, would be to graduate students on the basis of "mental capacity."

Reorganization of the university into three divisions instead of the present two—graduate and undergraduate—is contemplated by the young president. The three divisions would be: Collegiate, where

students would begin their work; university division, for formal educational features; and the graduate school, to remain much as it is now.

The plan would require the expenditure of large sums for new buildings and probably for a new campus for the collegiate division. The time of the student in the collegiate division would be determined not by the hours of credit gained but by his "reaction to the university's opportunities and his own qualifications for advanced work."

"The experiments of this division should center on the business of getting the student started on his education," Dr. Hutchins said. "Normally an individual might stay there two years, or he might spend one or three years in the collegiate division."

"Then, the student would enter the university, whose curriculum would be distinguished from the collegiate courses."

"In the university," Dr. Hutchins continued, "the student should begin the study of some division of knowledge of particular interest to him and with which he is qualified to deal."

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INTEREST ON HOME LOANS IN OREGON HELD TOO STEEP

PORTLAND, Feb. 23.—Development of Oregon by Oregon capital was urged here yesterday by William T. Lee, Klamath county assessor, who has returned from a trip to southern California. While Los Angeles building and loan associations are furnishing California home owners money at 8 per cent, Lee said, "Klamath Falls workers—and other Oregonians—are forced to pay from 9 1/2 to 13 per cent interest on Oregon money to build their homes."

While in California Lee tried to obtain some cheaper money for development of Klamath county. "There was lots of capital available," he said, "but none for southern Oregon." He said he interviewed directors of \$5,000,000 to \$10,000,000 associations and found them all investing their money inside the boundaries of their state, and mostly in the southern part of the state.

Lee declared that "Oregon associations should learn a lesson from California associations who are thankful to get 8 per cent for their money and never get more than 10 per cent, while Oregon home builders can't get money for less than 9 1/2 to 13 per cent."

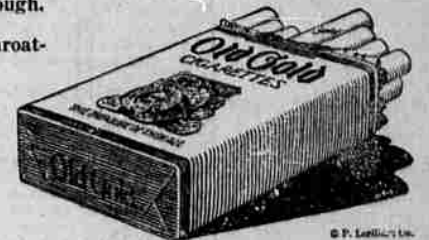
