WESTERN OREGON TRAFFIC ASSN. TO BE PERMANENT

Considerable interest was manifested in the meeting of the Western Oregon Traffic Association held at Medford last evening, when representatives from Eugene, Cottage Grove, Medford, Salem, Roseburg, Klamath Falls, Grants Pass, Sutherlin, Klamath Falls and other points gathered to hear the report of Atorney Ellis of Salem on the proceedings that were recently held before the Interstate Commerce commission. After dealing at length on the subject of the inequalities of the freight situation, Mr. Ellis quoted Mr. Harvey, the public service commissioner's freight expert, that the association had clearly demonstrated its usefulness, borne out by the many freight reductions that the carrier companies had put into effect, since the association was formed a year ago.

Arising out of the discussion that followed, it was resolved that the association be reorganized on a permanent basis with one or more rate clerks to watch all rate structures and to cooperate with every community in southwestern Oregon. It was pointed out that the state chamber of commerce had such a project in view but it was felt that there were too many difficulties of such an organization under the state chamber provision. Its ultimate worth, A. C. Marsh and E. C. Kingwell were constituted a committee to investigate the situation and to report their suggestions at the next meeting.

Mr. Marsh, Frank J. Norton, V. S. French and Mr. Kingwell were the representatives from Roseburg and Sutherlin.
