

BASKETEERS OF ROSEBURG SCHOOLS WIN THEIR GAMES

Two Roseburg basketball teams won games last night, the senior high school team, undefeated leaders of the Southwestern Oregon A League, defeating Myrtle Point at that place, 23 to 16, while the Roseburg junior high school won here from Medford junior high by a score of 14 to 13.

The senior high team is worried over its game tonight with Coquille. The Coquille team has not been defeated on its own floor this year, and in the contest played with Roseburg a short time ago gave the local boys a very close and hard fight. If Roseburg should lose tonight's game, the team will be tied with North Bend for the championship, leaving the title to be determined in the game to be played here next Friday night, when North Bend comes to Roseburg. Even if Roseburg wins, North Bend will still have a chance to tie for first place if the local boys can be beaten on the home floor. Quite a number of local fans are going to Coquille tonight to "root" for the Roseburg team in this very decisive game.

Fast Contest Here
The contest last night between the Roseburg and Medford junior high school teams was very exciting. The Medford team was handicapped by the absence of two of its best players, who are ill.

Medford took the lead in the first quarter, but Roseburg brought the score up 1 to 3 in Medford's favor at the end of the period. In the second quarter Roseburg forged into the lead by a narrow margin and was ahead 9 to 7 at the half. Medford, however, tied the score as the third period opened, and from that time on the lead alternated between the two teams, first one being ahead and then the other. At the end of the third quarter Medford was leading 13 to 12, but near the middle of the last period Roseburg tossed in a long basket that gave a score of 14 to 13. From that time on both teams fought frantically for a winning basket, but the guards on both sides were checking closely and there were no more scores.

Gilinsky, Medford guard, was by far the outstanding player on the floor, making 9 of Medford's 13 points. His floor work, however, was exceptional and he was in the midst of every play.

Incidentally the Medford team was accompanied by two former Roseburg residents, Prof. Ray Henderson, who resided in Roseburg for many years, is a coach of athletics in the junior high school, H. W. Quinlan, former principal of the Benson school, now located in Medford, accompanied him to this city as an assistant.

thorities called by William, Dynamite Wins.
The defiance howitzer company of the national guard set up a 37 millimeter field piece and ripped the house with about one-pound shells, but Floerke held out.

"Rev. Miller reported later, 'Dr. Snook ate heartily and we talked of pleasant subjects. No reference was made to death, murder or electrocutions.'
Rev. Miller administered communion to Dr. and Mrs. Snook and Mrs. Snook took leave of her husband. Snook remarked later to Rev. Miller that 'it was too bad it took a lump like this to make him realize how wonderful she was.' Neither was hysterical.
Death Met Bravely
Three guards and two ministers escorted Dr. Snook the few steps from his cell to the chair. He walked with firm steps and erect head. He said not a word. His eyes took in the crowd and his teeth were clenched behind his lips. He stepped bravely into the chair.
Rev. Miller said, 'The Lord be with you' and an official signaled to three guards in another room who threw three switches, two of them blank. Three times the current was turned on, and after a three-minute wait five physicians pronounced Dr. Snook dead.
Confession Made
Dr. Snook had confessed, Warden Thomas admitted yesterday, that he planned to end his three-year friendship with the girl after she threatened to expose him. He 'feared disgrace and loss of position' and he cut her throat and battered her skull with a hammer to make the deed look like the work of a fiend.
He was convicted in common pleas court here last August 14 after giving testimony to acts of degeneracy which he repudiated yesterday. The Ohio state supreme court gave him three reprieves but successive appeals which finally reached the highest tribunal in Washington failed to save him.

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GROUND GLASS O. K. FOR COWS, JURY AT MARSHFIELD SAYS

MARSHFIELD, Feb. 28.—Broken glass is not fatal to dairy cattle, according to a verdict returned by a Coos county jury today in the case of H. C. Christensen, Bandon farmer, against Jamieson and Kay, feed store. A verdict was returned for the defendant.

Christensen, asking \$2350 damages, charged that he had purchased an 89-pound sack of beet pulp for cow feed from the defendants. This he fed to the cattle and one cow died within 24 hours and 16 died within 20 days, all of them from the effects of broken glass contained in the mash.

The defense introduced expert evidence to show that glass will not kill a cow. A Bandon butcher, as an expert, testified that he had fed a gallon of feed, containing a handful of broken glass to a cow in his slaughterhouse 22 hours before she was butchered. The cow, he said, suffered no ill effects from the glass. The stomachs and esophagus of the cow were introduced in the trial. The jury was convinced.

SPAIN IN GRIP OF ANOTHER DICTATOR

(Associated Press London Wire)
MADRID, March 1.—Spain today found itself for all practical purposes under a new dictatorship. The Berenguer government having been overthrown with permission of the Cortes, a new government has been formed by a group of officers and civilians, headed by General Primo de Rivera, who has been indefinitely postponed by decisions of the Berenguer cabinet because of the demonstrations which followed the recent speech of former Premier Sanchez Guerra which caused the cabinet to conclude that to attempt the elections would be dangerous to the public peace.

Similarly all pending political meetings have been suspended. If one Sanchez Guerra speech could raise such a flurry through Spain including crowds in the streets trying to parade to the royal palace shouting "Down with the king!" the government intends to take no chances of inflaming the populace through more speeches.

DERN AND LEWIS WRESTLE TO DRAW
SALT LAKE CITY, March 1.—Ira Dorn, Salt Lake City heavyweight, and Ed "Strangler" Lewis, former world's heavyweight wrestling champion, wrestled to a spectacular draw here last night.

Lewis won the first fall in an hour and 50 minutes with a body clutch but Dorn took the second in 22 minutes with an airplane spin. Lewis weighed 235 and Dorn 200 pounds.

In the semi-final, Howard Cantonwine, 225 of Iowa, and John Spellman, 200 of Texas, wrestled to a draw.

CHURCH DESECRATION
ROME, Feb. 28.—All churches in Rome today held exorcism services because of sacrilege committed during the night at the church of St. Mary Major. Some one broke open the tabernacle, stole the host and chalice and threw the sacred particles in it into the street.

BOY KILLER, 17, DRAWS IMPRISONMENT FOR LIFE
SPRINGFIELD, Wash., Feb. 28.—Robert LaRue, 17-year-old Minnieapolis youth, was sentenced today to life imprisonment in the state penitentiary at Walla Walla for the murder of a detective.

The youngster who opened fire in a hotel room while Detective Roy Forrester was searching him for concealed weapons, thanked the court for "the fair and unbiased manner" in which the murder trial was conducted.

LaRue was also sentenced to serve five to fifteen years for first degree assault. He shot at Detective Charles Bradley, who was with Forrester. The sentences run concurrently.
