OSAKA, Japan, Feb. 28.—Oil and water do mix. As the result of experiments the railway ministry has ordered 40 per cent water added to oil used for lubricating locomotive cylinders. The compound does not carbonize when heated and is less harmful to cylinders. Besides, it is expected to save \$100,000 a year.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—In a lengthy telegram to the Alabama Democratic state executive committee, Senator Heflin of Alabama, today urged the ban against candidates in the democratic primary who refused to support the presidential candidacy of Alfred E. Smith be lifted and a "fair-for-all white democratic primary" be allowed.

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Know Your State



Over 40,000 Acres Set to Apples; Oregon's Crop Last Year Worth \$6,250,000.

Oregon has over 40,000 acres devoted to the production of high quality apples. Oregon orchards in 1929 produced nearly 7,000,000 bushels of apples which were worth six-and-one-quarter million dollars. Oregon was one of the first states to market apples in boxes instead of barrels. Hood River is the center of the big commercial apple production. Apples, however, are produced in large quantities in practically all eastern Oregon counties, in western and southern Oregon fruit districts also. The Rogue river crop in 1929 was worth about \$600,000. Hood River ships annually about 3600 cars. The growth of this industry led to new canneries being built here in Milton and La Grande. At Hood River the apple growers association is enlarging its canning plant. The Delicious, Rome Beauties, Spitzenberg, Newtown, Winter Banana, Grimes Golden, King, Ortley, and Gravenstein are the most popular varieties. Salem has 7,000 acres in its apple district. Oregon apples are carefully picked, graded, washed to remove every trace of spray, packed in new boxes with attractive labels, placed in cold storage and then sent in refrigerator cars to market. Thousands of boxes are exported to practically every country in the world. Whenever high quality apples are demanded, there you will find Oregon apples. The value to Oregon of this extensive agricultural enterprise has been recognized and the state chamber has devoted one of its attractive poster stamps to extending the fame of the Oregon apple.

It may be said that in our present stage of civilization, there are very few eyes that are really perfect. All eyes, however, that are slightly defective in their measurements do not necessarily require corrective glasses. The systematic examination of public school children has made it possible to detect and classify the different kinds of errors. The greater demands that are being put upon the eyes of the children, together with greater use of artificial illumination have resulted in producing symptoms of eyestrain and fatigue. The symptoms resulting from eyestrain may be local or general. The local symptoms are redness of the lids, itching and burning of the lids and eyeballs, pain and tenderness of the globe, pain above the eyes, seeding of mucus before the eyes, tendency of the eyes to cross, and temporary blurring of the vision after prolonged use of the eyes, caused by sleeplessness or fatigue, or the holding of a book too close to the eyes.

The general symptoms of eyestrain may be in the form of headaches, indigestion and other conditions not ascribed to the eyes. Headaches are more frequently caused by eyestrain than by any other cause. The headaches that last over night are usually the direct result of eyestrain and are the least frequently recognized as being due to eyestrain.

Continuance of eyestrain not corrected with properly fitting glasses may be associated with symptoms of disturbance of the stomach and intestines. Many nervous disturbances and twitching of muscles may also be due to eyestrain. These clear up with the wearing of proper glasses.

If the eyes of every patient were tested for acuity of vision more could be done towards the saving of eyesight and the prevention of blindness than any other preventive means. All cases of defective vision would be detected and in the majority of the cases if the patient were referred to an oculist the proper glasses would be secured and worn.

The proper illumination of schools, offices and factories is a most important factor in the conservation of vision.

Progressive vision have established special classes for those who are handicapped with serious defective eyesight. These are popularly called, "Sight Saving Classes". The Sight Saving Class helps the child by conserving his eyesight through eliminating all possible eyestrain and teaching habits of eye hygiene. This benefits his general health by saving him from the nerve strain attend-

ing the competition with the normally sighted. In every city there is a need of a sight saving class.
