GARDENS.....and Other Things

There has been no more striking development in this country for a good many years than the growth of interest in outdoor living.

This Corvallis station is one of the best for day-time reception and rose growers will find the talk worth listening to.

The Roseburg Garden Club is to have another stereoscopic lecture a week from today, Saturday, March 8. It will be by Miss Helen Kilkey, assistant professor of botany at O. S. C. Fuller announcements will be made in the News-Review later.

Here are some facts from the annual report of the Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs that will give some idea of what Garden Clubs in other towns are doing.

Astoria—Offered prizes for best display of marigolds, the official city flower. Held several successful flower shows. Sponsored shrub planting in the city. Aided cleanup campaign.

Albany—Several flower shows. Made a garden tour ending with a garden tea. Plant and shrub sale. Exhibited at Portland Rose Show. Has city planning and planting project in cooperation with city council, county court and service clubs.

Eugene—Four flower shows: early bulb, spring flowers, delphinium and pansy, and chrysanthemum. Held plant and shrub sale netting \$100. Active highway committee is working for development of Skinner's Butte park.

Forest Grove—Garden contests and children's gardens sponsored. Gladiolus show and plant and shrub sale. Entries in Portland flower show.

Grants Pass—Five flower shows: narcissus, tulip, iris, rose and dahlia. Garden contest judged on arrangement, varieties and culture. Another prize offered for garden having the largest number of varieties. Cooperating with Boy Scouts planted trees along highway.

Gresham—Four flower shows, two plant exchange, four field trips by club to local gardens and excursion to famous Blac garden at Woodland, Wash. Working with city council on beautifying entrance to city.

Hillsboro—Planted 250 trees co-operating with Chamber of Commerce in street beautification project. Orders for trees were taken by school children. One flower show.

Hillsdale Valley—Two garden contests with cash prizes, one for the best garden and the other for the most important one for the garden showing most improvement. Entries for this last contest were made early, the gardens were visited by the judges before any work was done and then judged at the end of the season. Flower shows.

A garden club from Corvallis City to see its famous dahlia. In the spring each member plants some one thing in quantity so as to have a surplus to contribute to the plant exchange, an annual event.

Klamath Falls—Club only a year old. Held flower show. Sponsored a yard contest for purple and white flowers only. In honor of the Elkton club.

Medford—Built a rock garden at Boy Scout headquarters, placed markers on all plants and shrubs in city park and library grounds. Got 150 school pupils to plant trees. Garden contest, plant exchange, two flower shows, Chamber of Commerce furnishes \$100 to be used by club for prizes and city beautification.

McMinnville—Flower shows, planted two gardens at highway intersections, one of iris and one of daffodils. Daffodils also naturalized along Tillamook highway to the coast.

Monmouth—Club called Civic Club. Main project the development and maintenance of the city common, at expense of \$500, in far relation by entertainment sales, etc. School essay contest on "How it can help beautify Monmouth". Helped plant school grounds. Have noon luncheon at hotel once a month.

Portland—Has 81 active and 169 associate members. Published a list of 55 gardens open to visitors. Held eight morning educational programs. October plant sale netting \$377. Two flower shows. Billboard committee especially active in agitating against advertising billboards. Active support of Portland Rose Test Gardens where 477 new varieties of roses are being tested. Making collections of colored stereoscopic slides for use in garden club meetings.

And there are other clubs not reporting. Altogether it is a fine showing.

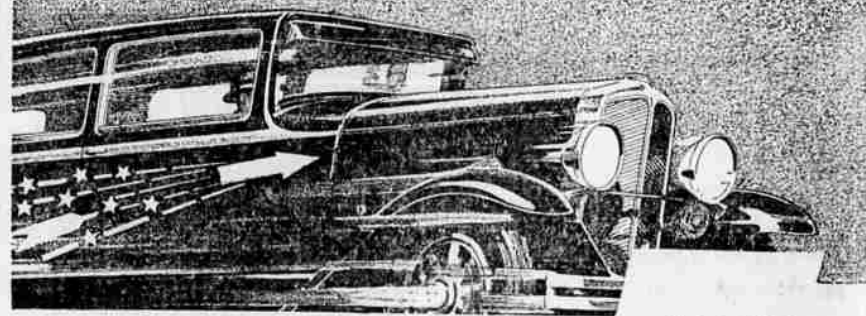
